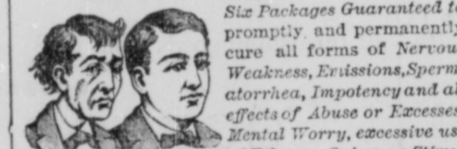
Not Used to Fragile Pieces.
