

# Canadian Uranium May Go To Japan, Howe Announces

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada will sell uranium to Japan once the United Nations sets up ground rules for international sales, Trade Minister Howe said Monday.

Back from a 16-day goodwill jaunt to that country, he told a press conference the Japanese are "very interested" in buying Canadian uranium to build up industrial power needs.

Canada, he said, will be "very glad" to consider the Japanese application once the UN sets up sales regulations. Currently Canada sells uranium to the United States Atomic Energy Commission only. A deal also is being worked out to ship the atomic material to the United Kingdom.

Mr. Howe was enthusiastic about trade prospects with Japan. With a present population of 90,000,000 growing by 1,000,000 a year, Japan would provide an increasing market for Canadian wheat, barley and other goods.

He gave these specific examples:

1. Japan purchased iron ore from Vancouver Island mines. One of these mines was worked out and the Japanese were phasing the net for more Canadian ore. They have suggested a smelter be set up on the Canadian west coast for producing pig iron and ingots for Japan. Mr. Howe said he will explore the possibility of developing such a project.
2. Japan got most of her oil from the Middle East. A major impact of the Middle East turmoil likely will be an increasing market for Canadian oil.

**CANADA POPULAR**

The Middle East crisis and Canada's sponsorship of a UN police force for that area apparently aided Mr. Howe in his relations with the Japanese. He said the Japanese felt Canada is the "saviour of the world" and that External Affairs Minister Pearson is the world's leading statesman.

Accompanied by one of his deputies, Mitchell Sharp, Mr. Howe conferred with the Japanese emperor, and the prime minister and the cabinet. He visited shipyards, mills, bakeries and various industrial centres. He found Japanese industry vigorous and efficient.

He saw big, 40,000-ton tankers, under construction and in some shipyards found Canadian inspectors at work. The Japanese were building four ships for Canadian firms—two for Imperial Oil Ltd. and two for the Aluminum Company of Canada.

Wherever he spoke, Mr. Howe emphasized the need of Japanese textile manufacturers being careful not to flood the Canadian market.

The Japanese were hoping to step up their sales to Canada and Mr. Howe agreed there was room for increasing the flow of certain Japanese goods such as oil pipe which that country now is shipping to Canada.

## Remembrance Day Ceremony Is Held At Georgetown Monday

Remembrance Day was fittingly observed at Georgetown on Monday, November 12th, when at 10:30 a.m. a parade formed up at the Legion Home and paraded to the monument.

Following the ceremony there, the parade proceeded to the town hall where the final phase of the program was held.

Following is the order of parade: parade marshal, D.A. MacCormack; standard bearer and color party; veterans of both world wars; Canadian Legion Ladies Auxiliary; Boy Scouts; Cubs; Girl Guides; Government representatives; Mayor and councillors; Clergymen; school children and citizens.

The program at the war monument opened with the singing of "O Canada", by the school children, followed by two minutes silence. The poem, "They Shall Grow Not Old" was read by Marcellus Gotell, president of the Georgetown Branch of the Canadian Legion. Rev. W.A. Paterson then offered a prayer. A roll-call of Georgetown veterans who died in two world wars was read by the parade marshal.

The laying of wreaths then took place in the following order: Provincial Government, by Mr. Harvey Douglas, M.L.A.; town of Georgetown, by Mayor P.L. Boudreau; Georgetown branch of the Canadian Legion, by president Marcellus Gotell; Canadian Legion Ladies Auxiliary, by vice-president Mrs. J.W. Lavers; next of kin of departed veterans; organizations and general public.

The ceremony at the town hall was presided over by the branch president, Mr. Gotell, and opened with the hymn, "Oh God Our Help In Ages Past", played by Miss Genevieve Solomon. This was followed by remarks by His Worship Mayor Boudreau, Harvey Douglas, M.L.A., Rev. W.A. Paterson, Mr. T.J. Kichham, M.P. and Mr. S.S. Hessian, M.L.A.

Mr. Gotell, spoke briefly, and this was followed by the playing of "The Queen".

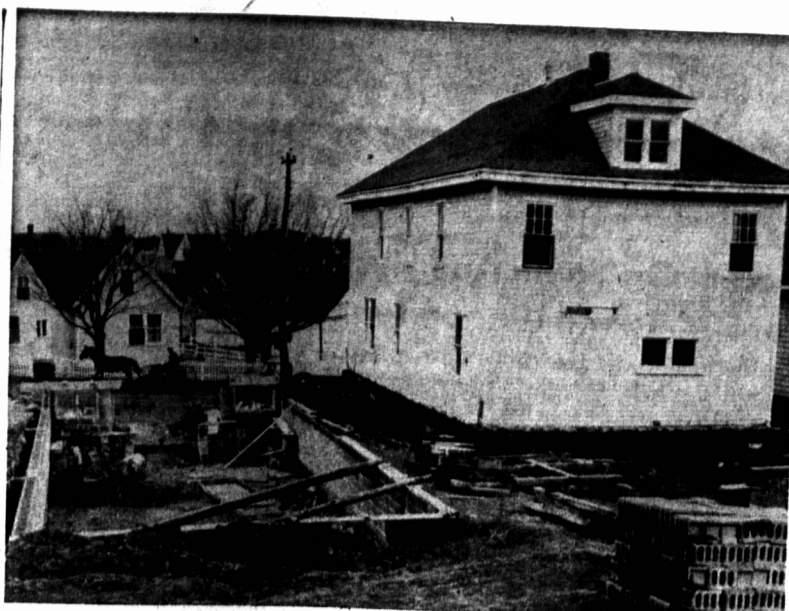

## Montague Council Discusses Parking Problem At Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Montague Town Council was held last night in the council chambers, with Mayor B.H. Yeo presiding. Present were Councillors Green, Clements, Vandiering, Nicholson and McGowan.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved and bills ordered paid.

A discussion followed on the gravelling of lots to ease the parking situation within the town, and recommendations were made.

It was decided by the council that \$50.00 should be donated to the Springhill Disaster Relief Fund.

Councillor Clements reported that a lot had been recently purchased from Mr. Joe Lannigan as a future dump site, and the road leading into it was to be opened immediately.

Fire Chief Douglas Coffin then waited on the Town Council and requested sufficient funds to complete the installation of the buzzer system in the firemen's homes. The council approved of any expenditure up to \$150.00 to complete the job.

Considerable discussion arose regarding the spilling of gravel on the streets of the town by trucks, and the damage to windows incurred thereby.

Councillor McGowan, chairman of the finance committee, reported that the per capita tax had been received from the Federal Government, and approximately fifty per cent of 1955 taxes had been received.

Councillor Green reported that work being done on the sidewalks would be discontinued until next spring, with the exception of manholes and a few minor details.

Councillor Nicholson in his report mentioned the need of installing additional water tanks, which are necessary for better fire protection. It was decided to ask for tenders for sanding the streets and sidewalks during the coming winter. The council was very pleased to report a public spirited gesture made by the Montague Branch of the Canadian Legion which donated \$25.00 to the council to help defray the cost of Red Cross Swimming classes held were financed by the town.

Mr. Ralph Beck and Mr. Alan Nelson, acting as delegates of the Junior Board of Trade, then waited on the council to request the use of the main floor of the old post office building (now town property) for an agricultural museum. This request was granted, with the stipulation that the Junior Board be responsible for insurance on the building.
