Appearing on similar charges, three youths from Charlottetown, Kensington and Maximville all pleaded guilty to the charges and had their cases adjourned for one week.

GEORGETOWN — A special meeting of the Georgetown Lions Club was held in the Lion's Club Room on Tuesday night with Joseph E. "Sonny" Johnson presiding. The Lion's Prayer was read by Lion Allan MacPhee.

The secretary, Eric Wood, read the minutes. A detailed financial report was not presented, as this was not a regular meeting and as the treasurer, Guy Coffin, unavoidably absent.

Statements were presented regarding the income from the weekly dances, held in the rink dance hall and also of the proceeds from the canteen run in conjunction with the dances.

A number of matters relative to the operation of the weekly dances were discussed at length and decisions arrived at. The tree erected last Christmas was the subject of much favourable comment and added considerably to the town's Christmas decorations.

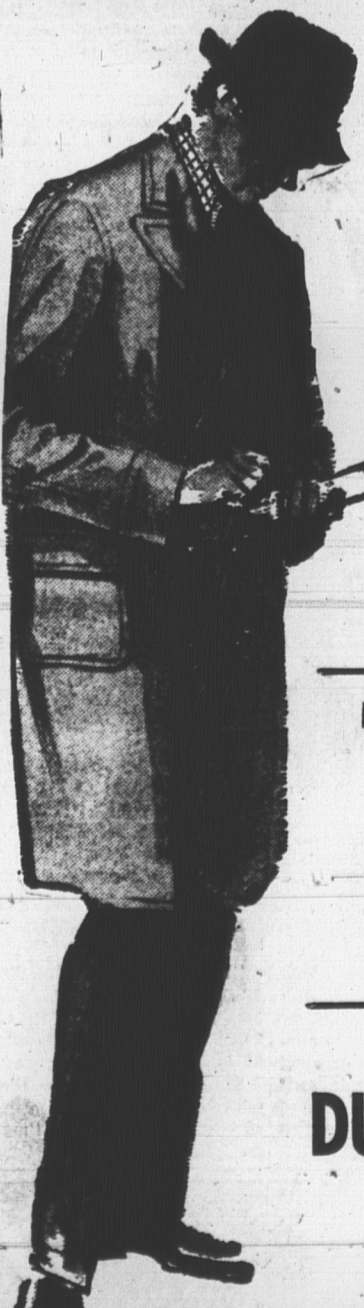

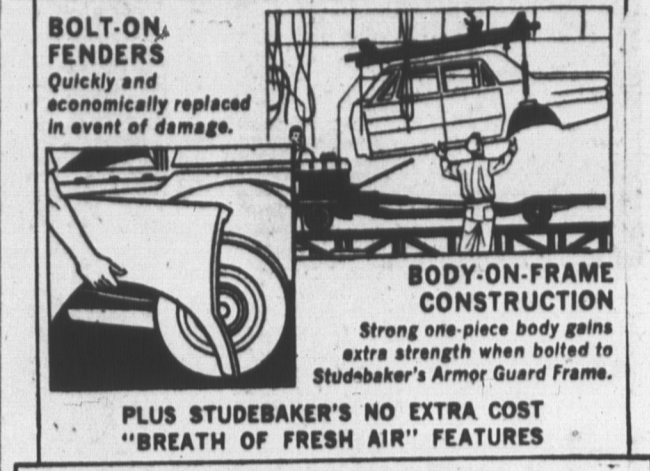

Theft Charge Nets \$30 Fine

Wedge, Summerside, was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days for speeding. Wendell G. Muttart of Albany, charged with failing to stop at a red traffic light, was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

Edison R. Martin, Hopfield, was fined \$5 and costs or two days for failing to stop at a stop sign. Wilfred B. Burke, city, charged with failing to supply additional information on request from the income tax bureau pleaded not guilty to the charge. The case was adjourned to Dec. 17. Two city residents and a Loyalist Road man, charged with the illegal possession of liquor, were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days. A city man was fined \$10 and costs or five days for being drunk and incapable.
