## Unexpected Entry Among Coloring Contest Winners

Myers, teacher at the Roman Catholic School on the Blood Reserve at Cardston, Alta., came into possession of the Guardian for March 27, which contained the Easter coloring contest entry form on the Easter bunny theme. Since there was only one Guardian coloring section available, Teacher, Myers had her students draw for it, and Leonard was the lucky winner.

Leonard did such a splendid job of the coloring, although his entry is ineligible because he did not deposit the completed job at the store of one of the merchants advertising in the section. The Guardian has donated a special prize for him, and it will be sent immediately to the Indian boy in Alberta.

# Province's 20th Anniversary Music Festival Opens Monday

Prince Edward Island's 20th Festival of Music gets underway this coming Monday, April 26. Charlottetown and Summerside will be the scenes of action Monday morning and Montague will get in on the celebration beginning Wednesday April 28.

Although competitions begin early Monday morning, the official opening and 20th anniversary night is set for Tuesday night at Confederation Centre Theatre.

Many persons have contributed much to the success of the festival during the past 20 years. A great many of these folks will be on hand to help celebrate this big occasion.

Contestants will occupy Birchwood High School and Prince Street School auditoriums during the week in Charlottetown. Of course, concerts will be staged in Confederation Centre.

At Summerside, action will be in Civic Auditorium and at Elm Street School hall. In Montague, pupils will be adjudicated at Montague High School auditorium.

Four adjudicators have been secured for the week-long proceedings. They are Eric S. Lewis, Toronto; Francis Cameron, London, England; Edgar Boucher, Belfast, Ireland and Christopher Le Fleming Sussex, England.

The festival is open to all residents of Prince Edward Island and is under the distinguished patronage of Lieutenant-Governor W. J. MacDonald and Mrs. MacDonald; Premier W. R. Shaw and Mrs. Shaw; Mayor Walter Cox and Mrs. Cox, Mayor W. E. Jenkins and Mrs. Jenkins and Mayor Bruce Yeo and Mrs. Yeo.

Opening day sessions in Charlottetown are: 9 a.m. Prince Street-Class 200 (Piano Solo-8 yrs and under); class 228-Piano duet (14 yrs. and under); class 213-Piano solo.

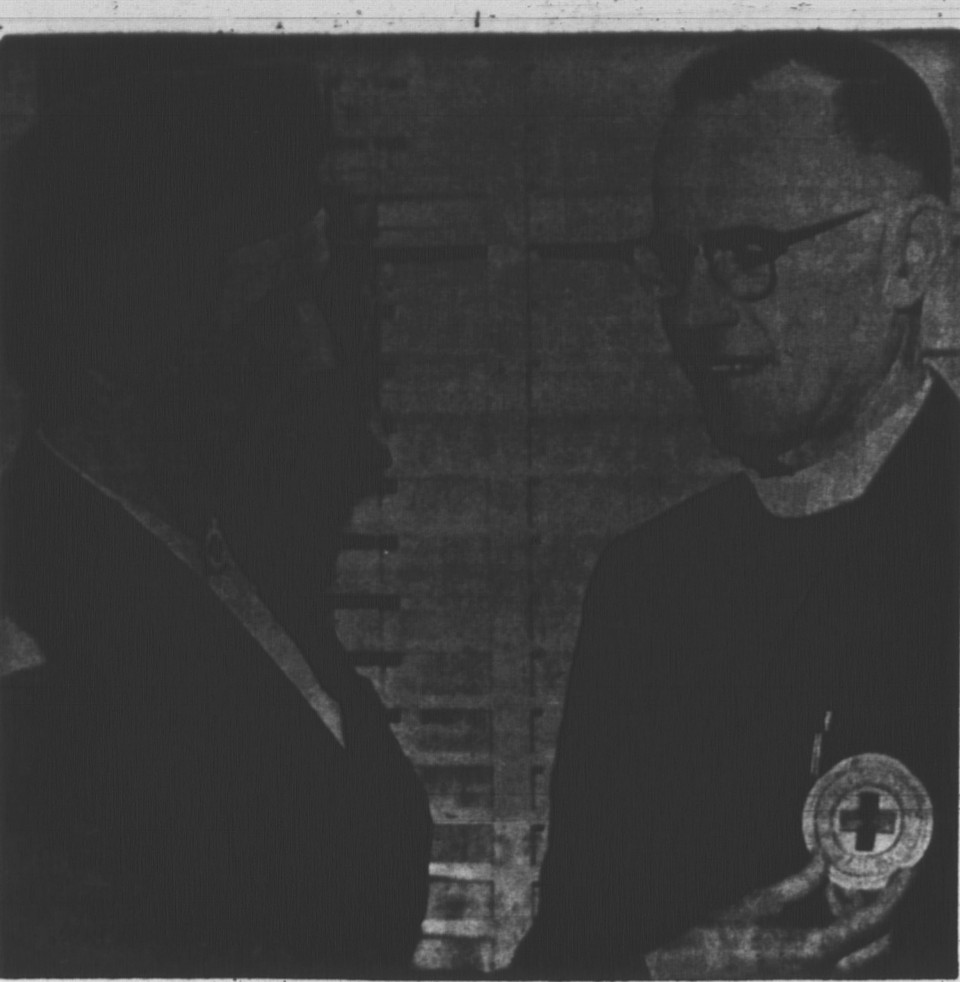

At Elm Street hall Class 89 (a) girls' solo, age 7 and 8 yrs will be heard first. Other classes will be class 90 (a) boys' solo, 7, 8, and 9 yrs and class 92, Folk Song, boys' unchanched voices.

Sessions at Montague begin at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning.

Those in charge of the festival this season have tried to make all night programs of utmost interest to adults. In this way, it is hoped to have increased attendances at all night sessions.

Twenty-six people re-qualified as Red Cross swimming instructors yesterday as the annual Red Cross Easter swimming school officially came to a close. Awards were presented yesterday afternoon at a banquet sponsored by the Royal Life Saving Society.
