

New Attention Being Paid To Correcting Voters' List

OTTAWA (CP) — Federal election officials will go out of their way to see that voters' lists are complete for the general election June 18.

Anyone whose name has been left off the list, and who wants to get on it, will be made a private visit by an election worker. Formerly, the first move was up to the voter.

The change results from an amendment to the Canada Elections Act, one which was approved by the 1960 session of Parliament.

Under the new system urban constituencies are broken down into several divisions, each comprising 25 polling divisions. Two revising agents are named for each district, one nominated by the party that was the seat at the last election, and the other by the number-up party.

Between the 24th and 16th days before election day—May 25 and June 5—these revising agents, one by one, will submit notification that their names were left off the electoral rolls. They will be given a chance to make out formal applications to have their names added.

For three consecutive days—the 18th, 17th and 16th days before election day—May 25—revising officer hold court on the applications brought before him by the voters. The revising officer has a quasi-judicial status, being the agent of the court, not the state.

If the officer is satisfied that the person in question is entitled to a vote, he adds his name to the list. If not, he must send the person a registered letter stating the reason. On the 15th day before the election—May 5—the revising officer hears final pleas from those who failed to get on the list.

Under the old formula, there was one revisal district, as a result of which many voters were overlooked.

Evidence Collected Panther Not Extinct

By JOHN MOSHER FREDERICTON (CP) — Evidence proving the continued existence of the eastern panther, once thought extinct, is reported in a new book by Bruce Wright.

"We know that today there lives in our midst a surviving remnant of the greatest predator that this continent has known since the Pleistocene," wrote Mr. Wright, stationed at the University of New Brunswick, where he is director of the North-eastern Wildlife Station of the Wildlife Management Institute of Washington, D.C.

A chapter on panthers is only one of many in the 288-page Wildlife Sketches series, published and printed here by the Press and Printing Co. (Ltd.). Other ranges from New Brunswick to the far North and Alaska.

The station here has the last known preserved specimen of the eastern panther—its western sub-species is known as mountain lion or cougar. This specimen, trapped and skinned near the Maine-Quebec boundary in the mid-1890s, did not come to general public attention until the winter of 1959-60, when a game

official saw the mounted skin and skull in the parish hall at St. Pamphile, Que.

MANY SIGHTINGS In 1921, Havelock Robertson of Munderville, N.B., and Roy Grant of Halifax trailed, shot and skinned a panther near Munderville.

Wildlife Sketches says the station here has a record of more than 100 New Brunswick panther sightings reports "that there is no reason for rejecting." In addition, plaster casts of panther tracks made in New Brunswick and areas from New Brunswick to the west have been positively identified at the U.S. National Museum.

"Track casts and sight records also have established its existence in the mountainous area of the Quebec — Vermont — New Hampshire border area, and in Minnesota at the head of the Great Lakes."

The book recalls that one authority considered the moose to be a panther's natural prey. In 1923, Caron disappeared from Nova Scotia in 1924 and from New Brunswick in 1927 as a result of timber cutting, fires, bad weather outbreaks and hunting. After reviving, moose began to decline in 1930 when a game

DEER DOMINANT Mr. Wright says experience in Newfoundland suggests that moose and caribou can coexist together successfully, "but if deer are present also and conditions favors them, disaster results eventually to the other two."

Nova Scotia's deer herd "that already outstripped the carrying capacity of its range in certain areas and is damaging forest regeneration despite a very heavy culling program."

Another chapter in the moose population has reached a level justifying a small but harvestable surplus. The present high deer population are the result of the paucity and recovery of the panther.

"The wolf of New Brunswick is a versatile wolf to a deer, but he is a brush-wolf to a zoologist. He is a shy shade from the black and white wolf who will do to pure coyote. The return of these two predators to the scene is good evidence that the natural balancing factors are beginning to work and that the deer population must be seeing its peak."

On the Atlantic black duck "We may reasonably assume that the (Atlantic) flyway is being overhauled," he said earlier in the Martlets—"Before long they may be all gone, left in the east."

"We may be thankful that it is still with us today in numbers," she says—"We have little to fear from shark attacks upon bathers and swimmers, or attacks on boats have occurred... in Canadian waters."
