"Yes," answered the somewhat satirical friend, "in the sense that history repeats itself."—Washington Star.

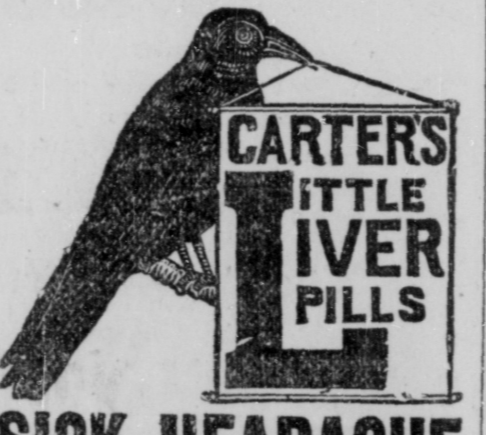
Too Hasty.
