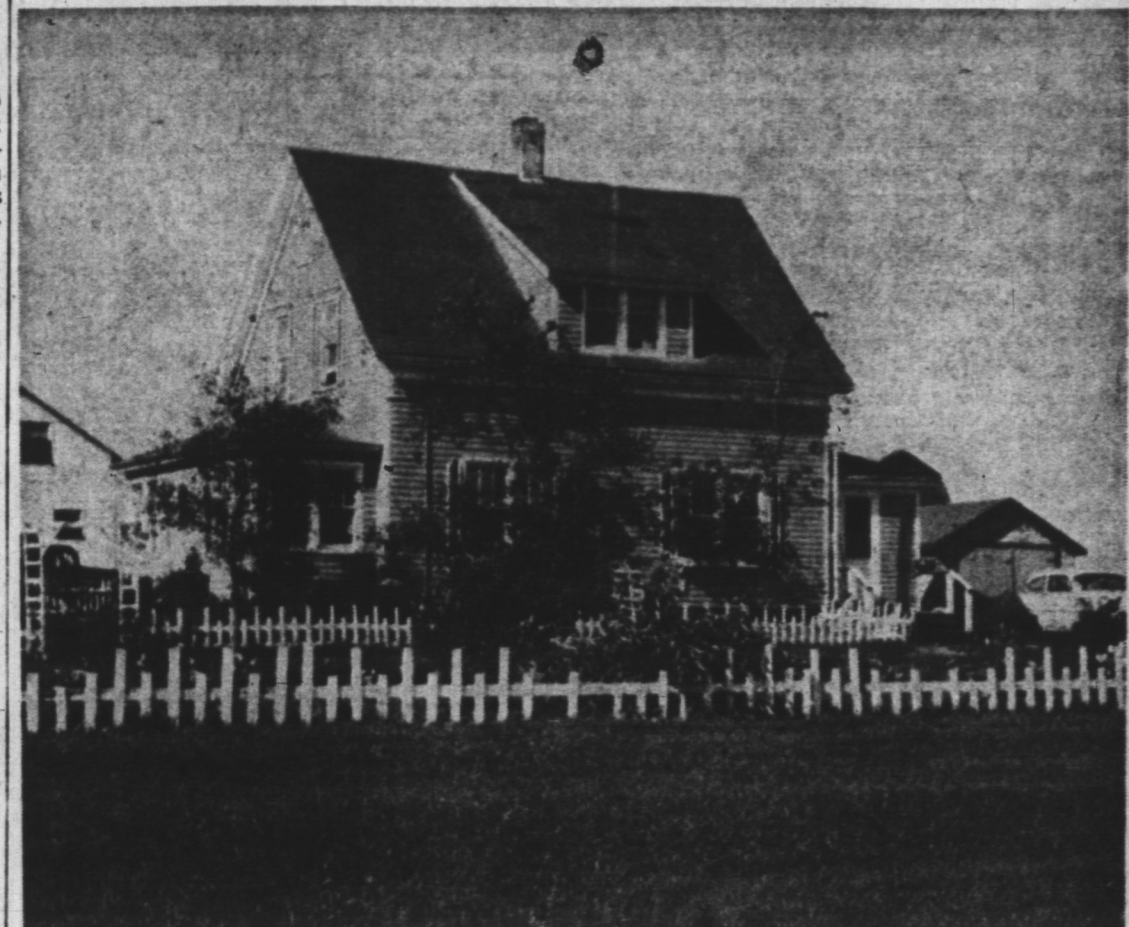


SOME RURAL BEAUTIFICATION WINNERS

Hi-Y Delegates Challenged To Acquire Wider Outlook

Hi-Y delegates attending their annual convention in Charlottetown this past weekend were challenged to a wider world outlook by a Yale Divinity student who has visited in 55 countries of the world and has recently returned from a 12 weeks tour of South America.

Robert A. Potter, 24 year old member of the theological class told the 175 Hi-Y members that they should work in close liaison with their respective church missionary efforts and such organizations as YMCA world service.

Describing moral conditions in a South American city, he said there were whole blocks set aside for prostitution only. He challenged the young people to attempt through their organization, to correct such conditions by bringing to the people of these areas a new set of ideals founded on Christian principles.

TONE SET

The tone of the three day meeting was set on Saturday morning when Garnet (Red) Sherwood, boys work secretary of the Y.M.C.A. in the Maritimes challenged the conference to a re-dedication of their lives to the principles of the Hi-Y organization.

Twelve different Maritime clubs were represented at the conference with the largest group coming from Halifax.

MISSILE CROSSES PATH

Yanks Fire Satellite Into Orbit Tuesday

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—The United States launched one satellite into orbit Tuesday and fired a missile across the path of another.

Explorer VII, a 9 1/4 - pound "gyroscope" satellite equipped to study cosmic radiation and other mysteries of space, was hurled into a low orbit by a Juno II rocket. It was another step in the American program to send a man into space within two years.

Earlier, a B-47 jet bomber flying high over Cape Canaveral fired a 37-foot Bold Orion missile across the path of the Explorer VII Paddwheel satellite. The shot could lead to development of air-launched missile to knock down enemy satellites.

The Paddwheel was at the low point of its orbit at an altitude of 146 miles and streaking through the skies at 2,000 miles an hour when the Bold Orion was launched. It was aimed to pass 10 miles in front of the satellite.

A reliable source said the Bold Orion sped 150 miles upward, reaching a point four miles above the satellite, then fell into the Atlantic Ocean 1,000 miles northeast of here.

The "gyroscope" so named because it resembles the whirling devices used to stabilize planes in flight, was placed in an orbit that carries it as far as 664 miles from the earth and as close as 346 miles. It is expected to remain up 20 years.

The national space agency in Washington said it completed its first circuit of the earth in 101 minutes. It was sending back information on the various hazards man will encounter when he first ventures into space.

Its most important task was to probe the lower levels of the bands of radiation hovering above the earth.

Auto Workers Raise Dues

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)—The United Auto Workers union Tuesday raised basic dues of the union's 1,200,000 members \$2 a month and then re-elected Walter P. Reuther as president.

Effective Jan. 1 dues will go up to \$5 from \$3 a month, but members no longer will pay a special strike assessment of \$1 a month.

The new dues rate earmarks \$1.25 for the strike fund to build it up to \$30,000,000 by 1961 negotiations in the auto industry. The fund now has less than \$15,000,000.

The convention's 2,500 delegates authorized the dues increase by a standing vote which Reuther said showed 80 per cent in favor of the increase.

A demand for a roll-call vote on dues was defeated. Reuther ruled that less than 500 delegates wanted a roll-call and the rules required at least 775.

Reuther's election by acclamation was declared unanimous after secretary-treasurer Emil Mazey, who also was nominated for president, declined to run.

The 52-year-old Reuther first was elected president of the UAW here in 1946.

Before taking up the dues question, the convention rejected a minority group's effort to have a dues increase as well as election of senior officers submitted to a referendum vote of members.

STUDY RADIATION

Packed into the satellite were instruments to measure (1) cosmic rays in and below the radiation belt; (2) the density of micrometeorites; and (3) sun-produced lyman-alpha ultra-violet radiation. The latter are believed to have an important influence on the weather.

Solar cells were included in the package to recharge the satellite's batteries. One cell was left unprotected from cosmic radiation and micrometeorites. If it operates, it may be possible to eliminate some protective devices from space ships to save weight.

The satellite also was equipped to measure the heat balance between earth and sun.

Crop Damage Probe In West

OTTAWA (CP) — The federal government has ordered an investigation into the seriousness and extent of crop damage resulting from heavy Prairie snowstorms. Prime Minister Diefenbaker announced Tuesday.

He told reporters following a cabinet meeting that a report is available and the government will go into the question of whether it is a matter of federal responsibility.

As yet, no request for aid had reached him from a provincial government.

An Edmonton report said the Saskatchewan government appealed to the federal government for special aid to meet farm emergencies caused by the storms.

Lake Stocking Needed Badly

PORT DOVER, Ont. (CP)—The Ontario Fishermen's Co-operative here reported Tuesday that neither federal nor provincial government appeared ready to take any action on a proposed scheme to re-stock Lake Erie with fish to save the fishing industry.

Tom Graham, manager of the co-operative, said there had been no reaction from the governments as yet, even though the fishing industry faces its worst depression in history. He said fishermen may not earn enough this year even to qualify for unemployment insurance benefits.
