Confirmation Son's Death Received by Island Parents

Official word has been received by Mr. and Mrs. Dominic MacDonald, North Wiltshire, confirming the death of their son, Russell Leo, 26, of Vancouver, B.C.

He was a placer gold miner, and vanished after ferrying two companions across Hay Lake, on July 28, some 40 air miles North East of Quesnel, B.C.

A seven man ground search party scoured the grizzly bear infested shores of the lake, but found no trace of MacDonald, and believed he drowned when his boat overturned.

On August 14 the R. C. M. P. recovered the body on the northern shore of Hay Lake. Police said, "only an expert woodsman could survive in the rugged territory which surrounded Hay Lake."

The late Mr. Russell is survived by his wife Helen of Vancouver, B.C. and leaves to mourn, his heartbroken parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dominic MacDonald six brothers and four sisters. The brothers are: Maurice in Kellys Cross, Stephen in Toronto, Frank, James and Louis in Vancouver, and Leonard at home.

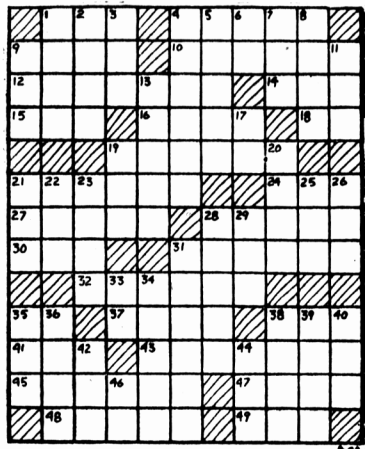

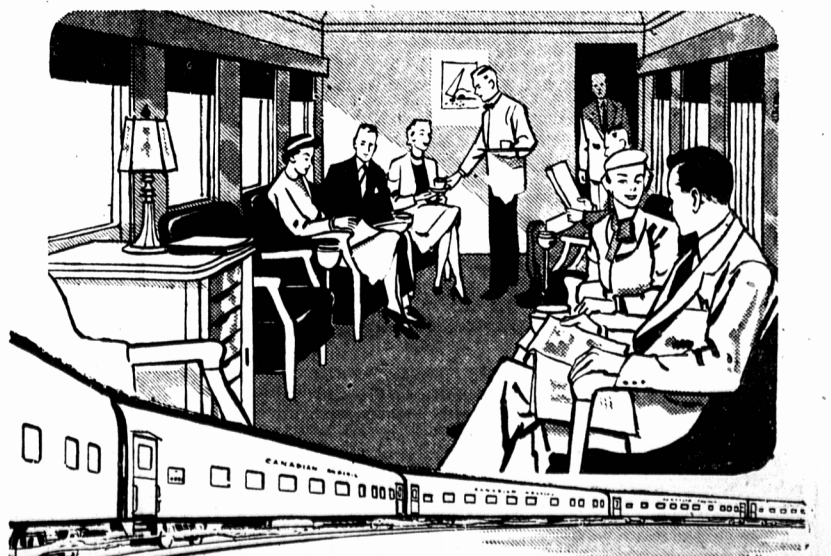
