NO 1 ARTILLERY WINS TROPHY

(Continued from page one.)

The first was won by C J McMillan, H Ritchie second and H Bethune third. Time 23 2 5. The second heat was won by Stephen, P. A. Duffy second and E Ritchie third. Time 23 1-5. The final heat was won by Stephen, P. A. Duffy second and E Ritchie third. Time 23 2 5.

The quarter mile run was won by P A Duffy; R A Donahoe second and C J Mitchell third. Time 56 seconds.

The 120 yards hurdle race was won by H L Ruggles; K McPherson second, P A Duffy third. Time 17 1-5.

Teams from the Montague Company (No. 5) and No 1 and 2 Companies 4th Regt., C. A., were entered for the 40-lb gun shift. No 5, under Capt W A Johnson, did the shift first, and elicited applause from the spectators. Their time was 3 min 10 sec. No 1, under Capt Bartlett, was next. The time was 3 min 9 sec. No 2, under Lieut Peake did the shift in 3 min 7 sec, and were thus winners of the competition.

There was one event that was specially interesting, because it was something new in Island athletics and because in itself it is one of the best of all contests. This was the relay race. The only teams entered were one from No. 1 Co. Artillery and one from No. 2 Co. Artillery. The race was a mile of four laps, and the following were the runners of each quarter, the first being of No 1 Co and the second of No 2 Co:—D A McKinnon and J B Hughes; Leslie Adams and L McIntyre; B Huggan and H Bethune; C J McMillan and P A Duffy.

No 1 Co won the race. The first pair came in together. Adams of the second pair gained a great lead on McIntyre which Bethune lessened when he and Huggan ran. The last pair ran the best race of the day. C J McMillan was in his old form. Duffy, who appears not to know fatigue, ran a wonderful race and kept crawling up upon McMillan till the last turn. From here to the finish no change in the distance from man to man took place and McMillan won by about twelve yards.

No. 1 Co. Artillery wins the trophy with 6 1/2 points, No. 2 Co. has 4 1/2 points, and No. 5 (Montague) 4 1/2. The Engineers ran up 10 1/2 points, while No. 2 Co. 82nd Regt., one man, made 10 points.
