Bold Venture Captures Kentucky Derby In Upset

Outsider Beats Out Brevity In Thrilling Stretch Drive; Vancouver Horse Third

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 3.—The name of Bold Venture was enrolled today as the longest shot winner of the Kentucky Derby in 18 years after the speedster survived a rough-and-tumble thoroughbred battle and a thrilling stretch drive Saturday to win the 62nd running of the classic.

To the astonishment of a record throng of 62,000 spectators and the confusion of the form players, Bold Venture stood off a terrific stretch challenge from Brevity, the 4 to 5 favorite, and won by a scant head in a whip-lashing climax to the struggle of three-year-olds.

Indian Brown, from the Vancouver stable of Major A. C. Taylor, finished third, six lengths back of Brevity.

Owned by Morton L. Schwartz, New York sportsman, Bold Venture paid \$43 for each \$2 mutual ticket, \$11.80 to place and \$6.60 to show. The winner's price was the biggest since Exterminator flashed home in front in 1918 and paid the equivalent of \$29.60 to one.

Bold Venture's victory was worth \$37,725 to the colt's owner. So bitterly-waged was this battle of speed and stamina, as the 14 horses sprang from the stall gates, that William Woodward's Granville, one of the prime choices, lost his jockey, while the highly-favored Brevity was nearly knocked off his feet at the outset, and Ira "Babe" Hanford, the winning rider, was promptly suspended for rough riding, along with two other jockeys.

It didn't alter the outcome of the race, but it capped the climax of another highly-disputed running of the classic as the riders of three of the first four horses were set down, each for 15 days, as a consequence of their tactics. Suspended along with the youthful Hanford were George Burns, who rode Indian Brown, and Nick Wall, who took fourth place with C. B. Shaffer's Coldstream, three lengths behind Indian Brown.

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WindsorFords Win Canadian Hoop Title

WINDSOR, Ont., May 3.—Canadian basketball supremacy rested in the East tonight for the first time in eight years with Gordie Fuller's Windsor Fords in command. Fords won the senior men's championship last night by trouncing Victoria Dominoo, 40-23 for their third straight win in the best-of-five inter-sectional series.

There were times during the abrupt series when it seemed the towering British Columbian, denouncing the title they won a year ago as Victoria Blue Ribbons, would halt the dazzling Windsor attacks and perhaps lengthen the series. But none of these periods of doubt occurred Saturday night.

Having scored 47-36 and 33-32 victories in the first two games, Fords left no question regarding their ability to outpoint a team that averaged four inches a man advantage in height. After the first ten minutes they completely outplayed the western team.

It was the East's first conquest in senior basketball since 1928 when Windsor-Walkerville Alumni became champions. Since that time the title has switched from Vancouver to Victoria to New Westminster, making a one-year stop at Winnipeg.

This time the Dominooes were close only once. With 30 seconds to go in the second game they held a one-point margin when Toots Meresky, Windsor forward, scored with a shot from centre court that broke up the contest.

Should they raise sufficient funds, Fords will be eligible to represent Canada in the Olympic Games this summer at Berlin.

Ferrells Star As Red Sox Blank Detroit Tigers 6-0; Tribe Halts Senators

NEW YORK, May 3.—The high-riding Boston Red Sox, paced by the Ferrell brother combination of pitcher Wes and catcher Rick, shut out the world championship Detroit Tigers 6-0 in the rain at Boston today.

Jimmy Foss, first baseman of the league leaders, tallied his sixth home run of the year when he lifted the ball over the left field fence with one out and none on in the fifth.

NEW YORK, May 3.—In a wild and woolly ball game at Cincinnati in which the score was tied three times, New York Giants went 11 innings today to defeat Cincinnati Reds 7-5 before 19,448 cash customers.

The game was a double loss to Cincinnati. General Manager Larry S. MacPhail announced the indefinite suspension without pay of Paul Derringer, the team's No. one hurler last year, for falling to slide home in the fifth, after doubling and going to third on Cuyler's single.
