## Scores Victory After Extra Hole Playoff With Clubmate Bob Gray

Steady Art MacKenzie of Charlottetown, playing the most brilliant golf of his career, yesterday won the N. B. - P. E. I. Amateur and Open Golf Championships by defeating runner-up Bob Gray by a single stroke after 73 holes of gruelling tournament play.

The 30-year-old MacKenzie, who was once a caddy at the Belvedere Golf Course, sank a 20-foot putt on the 73rd rd. hole for a birdie three to win the coveted championship. Gray had a par four on the hole.

The two Charlottetown club members finished the regulation 72 holes of tournament play with identical scores of 208. MacKenzie fired a par 72 on his last round while Gray had a one-over 73.

They drove off on the 73rd hole with darkness approaching. Both were on the green in two strokes and both about 20 feet from the pin. MacKenzie sank his putt neatly while Gray missed the edge of the cup by a fraction of an inch.

MacKenzie's putt climaxed a thrilling round of golf for the championship. Gray, MacKenzie and Tommy Stewart of St. Croix, New Brunswick, started the final round with only one stroke separating them after 54 holes of play.

Gray and Stewart led with scores of 225. Stewart went out of the running with a nine on Number Seven while MacKenzie picked up one stroke on the first nine to square matters with Gray.

The two club-mates played brilliant golf on the last nine. MacKenzie, who was rated an outside chance of winning the crown before the tournament started, came up with a sure, steady game while Gray made a remarkable comeback after encountering trouble with his drives and putts.

Archie Skinner of Saint Andrews, New Brunswick, won the professional tournament with a score of 300. He fired two rounds of 72 and 74 yesterday to nose out Gene McNabb of St. Croix and Cecil Dowling of Charlottetown.

Dowling fired rounds of 74 and 73 to finish two strokes behind Skinner. The Charlottetown Club pro encountered trouble on the fourteenth hole when he struck a stump with his drive. He took an eight for the hole.

McNabb, who had led the professionals on the first two days of the tournament, fired rounds of 76 and 77 yesterday.

Doug Lewis, the sensational 17-year-old golfer from Moncton won the two-province junior title with a 72-hole score of 311. Lewis ended the meet in strong fashion carding a 74 on his last 18. Stewart of Fredericton was runner-up with a total score of 328 while Errol Nicholson of Charlottetown was third with 330 and Harry Simmons of Charlottetown fourth with 334.

Lewis shot steady golf throughout the tournament. He fired an 83 on the opening day and then came back with successive rounds of 77-77-74.

Pete Kelly of Fredericton, last year's amateur and open champion, finished third yesterday with a total score of 305. The Physics Training instructor from the University of New Brunswick had rounds of 78 and 75.

Tommy Stewart of St. Croix, who led the field after his brilliant 61 on Tuesday, finished fourth. Stewart took an 81 on his last round and wound up with a total score of 306.

Roy Morrison of Moncton and Bill Beer of Charlottetown tied for fifth position, one stroke back of Stewart. Beer had a hot morning round of 74. He shot an 80 in the afternoon. Morrison had 75 and 77. Possibly the most outstanding hole of the Gray-MacKenzie-Stewart final was the sixteenth. It was on this hole that Gray made his famous "Stump-Shot" and recovered to score a birdie four.

Gray's drive landed in the rough directly under a stump. He elected to play the ball and somehow shot it back onto the fairway. He landed on the green with his next shot and sank a 25-foot putt for the birdie.

MacKenzie also came through with a brilliant putt on this hole for a birdie. He needed the birdie in order to stay in the running, with Gray and sank a 12-footer.
