

THE MARKETS.

A Stiff Price for Potatoes—Oats a Cent a Pound.

In Charlottetown potatoes bring from 30 to 35 cents per bushel, oats 34 cents per bushel, and pork from 4 1/2 to 5 cents per pound. The bayers are paying 10 cents for eggs. They report the receipts light for the time of year.

PORK

Steady in all Lines—Featureless Market.

Montreal advices report business in provisions again very quiet, and the market was featureless, prices being steady for all lines. We quote Canadian pork, in barrels, \$15 to \$15.50; pure Canadian lard, in pairs, 6 1/2 to 7c per lb; and compound refined at 5c to 5 1/2c per lb. Hams, 10c to 12c; and bacon, 1 1/2 to 1 1/4c per lb.

The Chicago provision market is stronger. Pork advanced 5c to 7 1/2c, closing \$9 March, \$9.22 1/2 May, \$9.35 July.

There was no change in any line in the Liverpool provision market. Pork closed at 45; lard at 27-6 1/2; long cut heavy bacon at 27; long cut light at 27; short cut light at 27-6 1/2; and tallow at 23-6 1/2.

In Buffalo, N. Y., the market for live hogs is steady. No Yorkers sold over \$4, the general price for mediums was \$4 to \$4.02 1/2, with a few sales at \$4.05. Pigs, \$3.85; roughs, \$3.25 to \$3.50; stags, \$2.50 to \$2.72.

Dairy Products.

The cheese market is dead and unchanged. Buyers and sellers were apart on the remaining stock, and it would take 1 1/2 to 1 1/4c, to move any of it.

Butter is steady. Fine late-made creamery sells at 20 1/2 to 21c; Western dairy rolls, 15 1/2 to 16 1/2c, and tub dairy, 14 1/2 to 15 1/2c.

New York advices state that cheese business continues very active, both in local and out of town trade, with a firmer feeling all round. A Philadelphia buyer on the market for large white, and as stocks are light, he finds some difficulty in getting the desired quantity. The week is winding up in a severe position.
