

Nats' Killebrew Finds Going Rocky In Last Two Weeks

NEW YORK (AP) — Harmon Killebrew, Washington's erstwhile savior, has found the going rocky in the last two weeks, enabling Cleveland's Rocky Colavito to close the gap in the American league home run and runs-batted-in competition.

In seven games last week, Killebrew failed to hit a homer or drive in a run while Colavito had the homer and collected five RBIs. Their totals through Sunday's games were: Killebrew 32 homers and 80 RBIs and Colavito 30 home runs and 74 RBIs.

Killebrew has hit only .135 in his last 15 games with seven hits in 52 times at bat. This has reduced his batting average from .284 to .254. He has had two homers and five runs batted in during that span.

Meanwhile, Ernie Banks of the Chicago Cubs took over the National League lead in runs-batted-in and gained ground on Eddie Mathews of Milwaukee in the home run race. Banks drove home seven runs in last week's games, giving him 92 for the campaign. Frank Robinson of Cincinnati, the leader a week ago, managed only two RBIs for a total of 88.

Banks also raised his home run average to .27 by hitting a pair, followed by an out with a leg injury, has 29. Banks was his club's best batsman with 12 homers and 12 RBIs in 1959 when he led the Most Valuable Player award.

The American League batting race also continued to be close with only 11 points separating the top five. Roger Maris of Kansas City is the new leader, replacing Earl Averett's Harvey Kuenn. Maris led nine hits in 19 tries in last week's action. This enabled him to pick up 11 points to 344. Kuenn limbed five points to 343. Gene Woodling of Baltimore gained seven points to 340 with nine safes in 21 trips.

Nellie Fox of Chicago and Alvin Karpis of Detroit remained in a deadlock for fourth place. Each

moved up three points and showed a .333 average. Fox is the leader in hits with 132.

For the first time in more than a month, Milwaukee's Hank Aaron stopped a slide and gained ground in the National League batting derby. Aaron increased

his lead to 24 points by collecting 10 hits in 25 at bats and lifting his percentage to .363. Joe Cunningham of St. Louis tied teammate Bill White for second place by moving up two points to 339. White lost 10 points with a 6-for-27 performance.

Stengel Is Determined To Prevent All-Star Loss
BOSTON (AP)—Casey Stengel apparently is determined to prevent another American League defeat when the All-Stars of both circuits meet again in Los Angeles next Monday.

The Yankee pilot has replaced three pitchers and added three outfielders to the American League squad announced Monday by league president Joe Cronin.

Named to the pitching staff for the second game are Billy O'Dell of Baltimore, Cal McLish of Cleveland and Camilo Pascual of Washington. They replace Whitey Ford of Stengel's Yankees, Jim Bunning of Detroit and Billy Pierce of Chicago.

The three dropped hurlers were used in the first All-Star game at Pittsburgh July 7 which the Nationals won 5-4 with a ninth inning outburst climaxed by a mighty triple by Willie Mays of the San Francisco Giants.

With the squad limit raised to 26 players from 25, Stengel has added these fly chasers, Gene Woodling of Baltimore, Roger Maris of Kansas City and Bob Allison of Washington.

Third Major Loop Formed; Toronto Among 5 Founders

NEW YORK (CP) — Formation of a third major baseball league, with five founding cities including Toronto was announced Monday.

William Shea, chairman of New York Mayor Robert Wagner's baseball committee, said the new league — to be known as the Continental League — expects to operate in 1961.

Besides Toronto, founding cities are New York, Houston, Minneapolis-St. Paul and Denver. Shea said the league would have a minimum of eight clubs and there could be more. He said it would play a 154-game schedule.

In addition to the five founders, Shea said the following cities were interested: Buffalo, Montreal, Atlanta, New Orleans, Miami, Indianapolis, Dallas — Fort Worth, San Diego, Portland, Seattle and San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Each of the five founding cities put up \$150,000, to be deposited in the treasury of the new league. One of the stipulations in the organization was that each city should provide a ball park which will seat at least 35,000 fans.

Minneapolis announced it could reach this figure with very small expansion.

New York and Houston plan to build new stadiums. Denver is ready to expand its present park facilities. Toronto is starting negotiations with city officials on the matter of a new park.

Shea said he hoped to have two or three more cities lined up by Aug. 18 when his league meets with a seven-man committee from the major leagues including commissioner Ford Frick.

It was estimated that each club would be ready to invest \$2,500,000 in addition to making its deal for a baseball park.

"This will be baseball of the highest quality," said Shea. This league will be entitled to be helped in view of its contribution to baseball."

Representatives of the five founding cities were present at the press conference. The major league committee that will meet with the third league is composed of National League president Warren Giles, American League president Joe Cronin, National League Club owners Lou Perini of Milwaukee and Robert Carpenter of Philadelphia, and American League clubowners Tom Yawkey of Boston and Arnold Johnson of Kansas City, and Frick.

Frick said at his radio city office that he had been aware of the contemplated action.

"We are going to sit down and talk with them Aug. 17," he said. "At that time we will discuss the whole situation. Apparently they now have set up their organization."

Frick said he did not know whether the meeting would be held in Boston or in New York. Jack Kent Cooke, president of the Toronto club said he was prepared to spend \$2,500,000 to make a success of his team's entry in a third league.

"That is twice the money I offered to buy the Detroit Tigers," he said. "It is my money. It is not the city's."

Cooke said he believed Toronto, a city of 1,500,000 population would support a major league with the same zeal Milwaukee fans back up the Braves in the National League.

"In five years we should be playing in the world series.
