Potato Market Drop Seen Likely

A leveling off and lowering of potato prices within the next few days is feared by department of agriculture officials. Marketing Director Sangster said yesterday that recent good weather has made railway loading of potatoes very easy, and apparently too many cars have been loaded without a market. "There are too many cars on the track for which there is no ready market, and this is forcing dealers, particularly in the Toronto area, to cut prices in areas not especially interested in buying at the present time. This puts the wholesaler buyer in a position to bargain which is bound to have an adverse effect for the next few days."

Mr. Sangster suggested that growers watch their markets carefully. "If there is a market, he said, "then by all means load for it, but loading on speculation can be dangerous." The marketing director said that information on the overloading situation came from "persons in Toronto who are interested in maintaining firm prices." He said there is, at present, no accurate estimate of how much overloading has been done "but it is enough to affect prices." Mr. Sangster said he realizes that "many growers want to move their potatoes for financial reasons, but great care should be taken not to force an unready market."

NEW YORK (AP) — Federal mediation failed again Monday to settle a 16-day waterfront strike by 61,000 Longshoremen in U.S. east and Gulf coast ports. More than 100 ships lay idle and losses passed the \$20,000,000 mark.

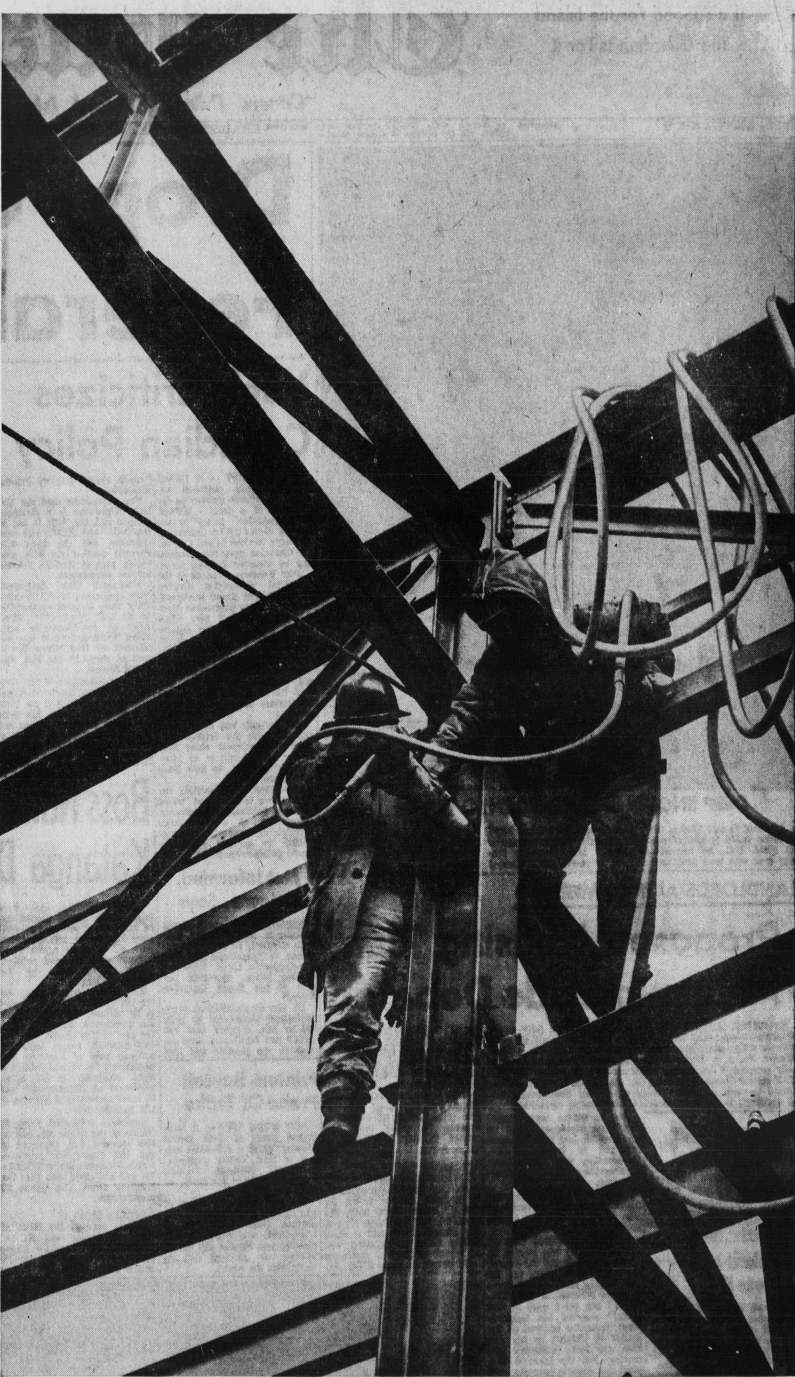

U.S., Russia End Talks Over Cuba

UNITED STATES (AP) — The United States and the Soviet Union ended their long round of Cuba negotiations Monday far from full agreement but they sounded a note of hope for improved East-West relations on other matters.

The move was in the form of a letter sent to United Nations Secretary-General U Thant by U.S. Ambassador Adlai Stevenson and Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Vasily Kuznetsov, who began their private Cuban talks last October.
