THE RELIEF OF MAFEKING

BURGHERS WERE COMPELLED TO ABANDON THE SIEGE.

Great Enthusiasm Prevailed in London Last Night.

Lord Roberts' Forward Movement — Boers not Showing Much Fight — It is said that Kruger Talks of Surrendering — The Boer Envoys.

SPECIAL DESPATCH TO THE EXAMINER.

RELIEF OF MAFEKING.

LONDON, May 19.—A despatch of the Associated Press announcing the relief of Mafeking, was posted outside the Mansion House last evening, and the news rapidly spread.

A great crowd collected. The War office at 9 o'clock last night announced that no news had been received, but at 9.40 the Lord Mayor announced the joyful news to the crowd outside.

The Lord Mayor briefly addressed the assemblage saying: "I wish your cheers could reach Mafeking (here the cheers were interrupted by redoubled cheering and singing of Rule Britannia) after which Lord Mayor remarked "we never doubted what the end would be, or that British pluck and courage would conquer at last."

The Lord Mayor then led the crowd in singing "God Save the Queen" and "Soldiers of the Queen," and with renewed cheers and waving of flags by the assembled multitude and singing of "For he's a jolly good fellow," the Mayor and party retired.

From the mention of the laagers in the Pretoria despatch, it is understood here that, prior to the raising of the siege of Mafeking, the Boer laagers around that place were vigorously bombarded by the British relief column, and that the Burghers were practically compelled to abandon the siege.

The mass of people outside the Mansion House grew to such dimensions that the police were compelled to divert all the traffic of omnibuses, etc., through the side streets.

The cheering was incessant. Later, special editions of the newspapers arrived and the tickers announced the news in all the public resorts.

In the West End, the leading thoroughfares were greatly impeded by the constant stream of populace cheering themselves hoarse.

The enthusiasm outrivalled the scenes which followed the relief of Ladysmith. At the Foreign Office nothing had been received in confirmation of the news.

As soon as information of the relief was received, the Lord Mayor sent the following despatch to Baden-Powell: "Citizens of London are relieved. They rejoice in good news received. Your gallant defence will long live in British annals. Cable me what money is wanted for needs of the garrison and inhabitants after long privations."

Mr. Chamberlain called at the War Office after midnight and received a tremendous ovation.

THE BOER ENVOYS.

New York, May 18.—The Boer envoys, accompanied by the Washington Committee, crossed over to Jersey City and took the train for Washington. There was no crowd to see them off and no demonstration.

EX PRESIDENT STEYN.

Pretoria, May 17.—Mr. Steyn arrived here last night, and is now in close conference with the Transvaal Government.

QUEEN RECEIVES THE NEWS.

LONDON, May 19.—The despatch con-

tinuing the announcement of the relief of Mafeking was sent to the Queen at Windsor Castle where Lord Salisbury was dining with Her Majesty and also to the Prince of Wales at Marlborough House.

LORD ROBERT'S ADVANCE.

KROONSTADT, May 18.—It is stated here, on good authority, that Kruger intends to surrender as soon as Lord Robert's army has crossed the Vaal in order to save the properties of the Transvaalers.

The Free Staters are very bitter realizing they have been made a catpaw by Pretoria.

Lord Roberts' advance from Bloemfontein to Kroonstadt was practically an unobstructed march. Boers did not fight, and failed to make any effective stand anywhere.

At Brandfort the Boers retreated before the British within rifle range, leaving Colonel Blake's Irish-Americans and other Outlanders to do all the fighting.

The same thing occurred at Zand river, the Boers retreating immediately after few shells came. Generals Botha and Dewit effected a juncture at the Zand river, but continued their retreat.

Mr. Steyn personally tried to induce the Burghers to stand at Kroonstadt, but failed. They continued to fall back, notwithstanding his appeals.

The Boer retreat was orderly, but sullen. The British made a very rapid march. General Botha with a handful of braves protected the rear, Kroonstadt was evacuated when the British were within a few miles.

ENTHUSIASM INCREASES.

LONDON, May 19.—There was no interruption up to noon to-day, of celebrations of the British successes in South Africa. In fact the enthusiasm increases.

DUPLICATED NEWS.

KROONSTADT, May 18.—General Hutton with his mounted infantry today made a dash upon Bothaville and captured three commandants and nineteen prisoners.
