

Rain Shows no Impact on Exhibition Events

The heavens opened up on the second day of Old Home Week in Charlottetown yesterday sending spectators running for cover.

However as "the show must go on" the midway did not altogether come to a stop as the rides and game booths with certain few exceptions showed little concern for those seeking it. Those who did not find cover at a booth or ride, took the opportunity of visiting one of the sidesteps on the grounds.

The bulk of the crowd headed for the coliseum, which was again neatly packed to overflowing, resulting in the cattle judging taking the largest crowd of spectators since the start of judging Monday.

The rain forced the cancellation of the afternoon and evening racing cards but spectators were back at the fair last evening although the walking was a little muddy.

Judging continues today with Agriculture, Sheep and Dual Purpose Shorthorn cattle being shown. Gurney will also be judged.

But the main attraction during the day and throughout the week will be the midway where the children clamor for a trip on their favorite ride. Many of the younger fair goers will view the familiar sights of those years while still others will be getting their first look at the wonders of a carnival.

Daisy Duck Owner Says Council Misinformed

A declaration that the city council has been misinformed was made yesterday by Thelma Erkelens, owner of the Daisy Duck, an amphibious craft used for taking tourists on sightseeing trips through the city and on Charlottetown harbor.

Mr. Erkelens said the council had received the wrong information if they believed souvenirs were being sold at the Daisy Duck on the corner of Gratton and Queen streets.

Mr. Erkelens' enterprise came under fire at Monday night's council meeting where it was charged with selling "souvenirs" of the ticket sold at the site.

It was also charged that complaints had been heard regarding almost "continuous" hawking of the ticket sold at the site.

The council passed a resolution ordering Mr. Erkelens to move the site of his operation. "The council is completely misinformed," Mr. Erkelens said. "We do not sell souvenirs. The Daisy Duck is only a tourist attraction. It is badly needed as it gives tourists something to do."

The owner said if the sound created by the loudspeaker was an objection, it would be a simple matter to have it removed.

Mr. Erkelens expressed the hope that the council would reverse its decision upon learning the facts.

Mrs. Cole, who played last Sunday in the Canadian women's close championship here, was even par on both nines of the 18-hole qualifying round at Glendale Golf and Country Club to share Calgary's Rae Millin, who had 79.

Mrs. Cole said the 6,585-yard course was playing long Saturday that caused a one-day postponement of the close championship.

Well off the pace Tuesday was Sue Hilton of London, Ont., who blew to a 42-47-59 after going three-under 76 at Winnipeg Embury to take both the Canadian women's close and junior championships.

N.S.-P.E.I. Blood Bank Said At Danger Point

A low blood bank reserve is at a dangerous point but as yet not alarming, F. A. S. Jones, provincial chairman of the Red Cross blood donor committee, stated last night.

The N.S.-P.E.I. blood bank is at present just barely adequate and failure of any clinic would cause an emergency shortage. The requirement for Island hospitals is over 700 pints per week and at present there are only over 400 in reserve.

The situation for this week will be remedied however if the clinics, currently being held in Nova Scotia are successful, he said.

Next week the Island will have eight clinics in operation. If all are successful the blood bank will be restored and the danger point will be passed, he said.

Blood Donor Clinics Slated At New Glasgow, N. Rustico

An enthusiastic meeting of blood donor committee workers at the Royal Canadian Legion in North Rustico on Monday evening. Representatives from New Glasgow, North Rustico and other districts finalized their plans for the two clinics which will be held next Monday, Aug. 20.

Mark Gallant led the discussion for the New Glasgow Junior Farmers group which will sponsor a clinic at the Recreation Center from 2 to 4 p.m. Monday afternoon. Bert Bousquet reported for the North Rustico Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion which sponsors a clinic at Stella Maria Hall from 8 to 10 p.m. next Monday evening. All lines are advanced summer time.

Provincial Blood Donor Chairman Stewart Jones, described the N.S.-P.E.I. blood bank situation and outlined the extreme seriousness of the present low supply. Mr. Jones reported that only slightly more than 400 bottles were now on hand against an established weekly use of over 700.

Mr. Jones emphasized the vital importance of every area filling its quota and obtaining additional blood if possible.

Committees from both centers reported their organization plans as well as established with posters and other advertising being widely distributed this week.

Highlighting the activities at both clinics will be the attendance of the North Rustico Band, a newly formed organization of local musicians which will play during the clinic hours and also tour the districts by truck.

It is hoped that many summer visitors will take advantage of the opportunity to support this Red Cross blood donor effort and that residents of the two areas will give strong support to these two organizations which have done a great deal of work. There are two clinics, one in the afternoon at N. Rustico, and the second in the evening at North Rustico.

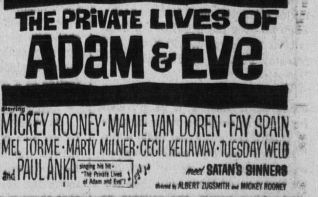
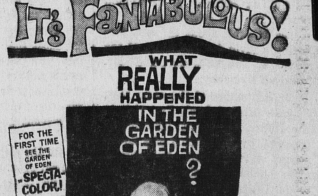
