Fresh Speculation As Allied Team Goes To Kaesong

MUNSAN, Korea, Sept. 19 — (Wednesday) — (AP) — An Allied investigation team went to the Kaesong neutral zone today under circumstances which stirred fresh speculation over the suspended Korean truce talks.

But the fact that newspaper men and photographers were barred from making the trip prompted belief the liaison officers might take up other subjects—such as reopening of the talks.

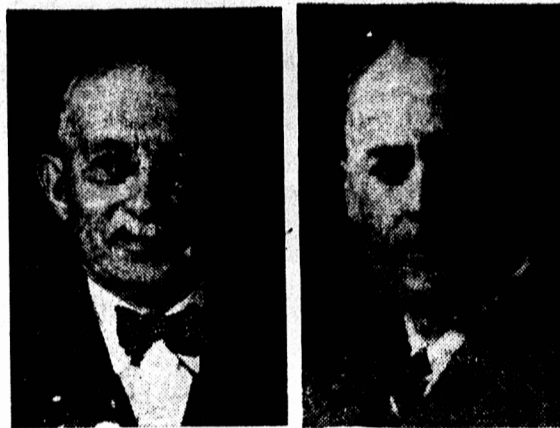
Newspaper men have been permitted on recent trips which involved only investigation of Red charges. The order barring reporters from making this morning's trip came from Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway's headquarters in Tokyo.

The investigation team set out from the Allied advance base camp in Western Korea for Panmunjom in the Kaesong neutral zone.

The Communists, in their latest charge, said four U.N. "military personnel" yesterday entered the neutral zone by crossing the bridge at Panmunjom. The Reds did not further identify the military personnel and did not say whether they were taken prisoner.

Annual Meeting Of Temperance Federation

Prior to the annual meeting of the Temperance Federation of Prince Edward Island yesterday, the Executive met in a morning session at 10.30. Rev. R. A. MacLeod of St. Peter's Bay was named to the Co-operating Committee with the other Maritime Provinces. Discussion regarding the hours of sale at the vendor stores resulting in a resolution to be presented to the annual meeting. Rev. John MacKay was appointed to represent the Province at the council meeting of the Canadian Temperance Federation in Toronto, December 3rd and 6th.

Reports were given briefly by the new Field Secretary, Rev. Dr. Ross C. Eaton and Mrs. Eaton, who are holding meetings during the month of September in the Province, with encouraging response both in interest and financially. On motion, the meeting adjourned.

Afternoon Session — The President, Mr. Gordon MacMillan, again occupied the chair at the afternoon session, which was opened with prayer by Rev. C. A. Britten of Bedeque. Mr. MacMillan welcomed the delegates and visitors in a short address, stating that it was encouraging to note the renewed interest taken in temperance. He quoted the saying of a temperance speaker: "The liquor traffic would destroy the Church if it could, the Church could destroy the liquor traffic if it would."

The minutes of the last annual meeting and of the last executive meeting were read by the Secretary, and will be adopted at the next executive meeting. The resignation of the Secretary, Rev. Howard Christie, was heard with regret. The following committees were appointed by the chair: Nominating: Rev. C. A. Britten, Rev. John MacKay, Miss Louise Callbeck; Resolutions: Rev. W. I. Green, Dr. J. A. Clark, Rev. Kenneth Campbell. Mr. Christie read the Secretary's report, and gave a resume on the subject of the appointment of a Royal Commission to inquire into the whole liquor question. The Treasurer reported a balance of \$1478.38; a budget amounting to over \$1500.00 was adopted.

Dr. Eaton gave a very searching and inspiring address. He stated that the liquor evil is very strongly entrenched in popular custom, in social life and in business interests. Encouraging factors are: (1) In this fight we are on the Lord's side, (2) There are signs that the Christian Church is waking up on the matter, (3) More and more we must build a brave new world, (4) The future and time are on our side. We have three fronts: The youth front, the home front and the Church front.

Mrs. Eaton gave a short address, basing her remarks on the subject: "On the Home Centre". Alcohol destroys the heart and soul, as well as the structure of the home. From 20 to 30% of

divorce cases can be laid at the door of alcohol. Ninety per cent of juvenile delinquents are due to alcohol. She appealed for: (1) Temperance education for youth, (2) A good and sincere example to youth by the older generation, (3) A firm stand on the part of women.

The report of the Nominating Committee was as follows: President, Mr. Gordon MacMillan; Vice-President for Kings, Mr. George Leard; Vice-President for Queens, Dr. J. A. Clark; Vice-President for Prince, Mr. Colin Waugh; Secretary, Rev. J. F. MacKay; Treasurer — Mr. J. H. MacFarlane.

Executive Committee: The above officers and seven members representing: W.C.T.U., Mrs. J. A. Clark, Charlottetown; Sons of Temperance, Mr. Frank Jardine, Wilmet; Baptist Church, Mr. Roy Campbell, Bedeque; Christian Church, Mr. Harry Linkletter; Presbyterian Church, Mr. George Jardine, Freetown; United Church, Mr. Robert Carruthers; Anglican Church, Mr. Reginald Haslam.

(3) We note the increasing use of intoxicants at social functions, and urge all citizens to be firm in their adherence to total abstinence principles at all times.

(4) Resolved that, since the Temperance Federation of P.E. Island with the full support of the W.C.T.U. and the Sons of Temperance groups, is giving leadership in contending against the liquor traffic, which is annually making more and more inroads upon the physical and moral welfare of this province; we therefore appeal for the full support of all ministers in becoming active members of this organization, and giving instruction on this important subject from their pulpits.

(5) That the churches give, not only moral but annual financial support to the Temperance Federation. If we had their active support, it would go far towards solving this great problem; and that a letter of appeal be sent by the Secretary to each congregation.

(6) That since it is the custom of liquor stores in other provinces to close on Saturday not later than 5 p.m., and to close before public holidays, we petition our Government to adopt a similar policy.

(7) That we express our appreciation to the following:

(a) To the minister and officers of Charlottetown Baptist Church for the use of their rooms for our meetings.

(b) To Rev. Dr. R.C. and Mrs. Eaton for their leadership in Temperance and their contribution to our meetings today.

All decked out with a flashy paint job and a complete overhauling which took 22,000 man hours of labor, C.N.R. locomotive No. 6403 is all set to haul the Royal train bearing Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh on part of their Canadian journey.

However, the big engine with her new coat of olive green and black with gold trimmings and white

wheel rims will not come to Prince Edward Island. When the Royal train is pulled off the M.V. Abegweit on this side of the Strait of Northumberland it will be hauled by one of the Island Division's diesels, as are all trains here now.
