Close Race In English Soccer League

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, April 16—(C. P. Cable)—Promotion and relegation problems again dominate the English Football League program Saturday.

Sunderland is undisputed champion of the premier league but at the other end of the table there are nine clubs separated by only two points, all in danger of relegation.

The long Easter program left the battle at the top of the second division more involved than before. Manchester United, West Ham United and Charlton Athletic are bracketed with 50 points but the United has the advantage with a game in hand and the best goal average.

Three To Beat In Kentucky's Classic Derby

(By Orlo Robertson) NEW YORK, April 15—(C. P.)—Brevity, Hollywood, Grand Slam—but look out for a dark horse in the 62nd running of the Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs, May 2.

The bookmakers have made the favorite in the pre-race wagering. Bookies have been known to be wrong, however. At least a half dozen more of the 15 or so three-olds expected to face the barrier are capable of showing the way home over the one-and-one-quarter mile.

Brevity gained his position as one of the shortest-priced future-book favorites in Derby history when he carried J. E. Widener's silks to a sensational triumph in the Florida Derby. Hollywood from Hal Price's stable has added several good workouts to his brilliant two-year-old campaign to his position as Grand Slam star of the Bomar Stable, rates because of his known mud-running ability.

But it is a difference of opinion that makes a horse race and what \$40,000 at stake many owners and trainers are not giving up just because the three favorites are the betting choice.

James Fitzsimmons, veteran trainer who sent out Gallant Fox and Omaha to capture two of the last three derbies, holds a strong hand. William Woodward's Granville, from the same stable that housed the Fox and Omaha, looks to be the best of the group but he also has from the Winstable stable, Shark and Teufel. As two-year-olds both rated near the top, although taking no outstanding stakes.

Then there is Colestream, C. B. Steffer's big colt which ran Red Rain a dead heat in the Saratoga Special. Tintagel was good enough to beat all of them, except Brevity, in the Belmont Futurity but there is some doubt about his staying ability.

Willis Sharpe Kilmer, who won the 1918 race with Exterminator, has a colt that can't be overlooked in Ned Reish, which was good enough as a two-year-old to win five stakes. Neither can Morton L. Schwartz's Bold Venture, being conditioned by the capable Maxie Hirsch be overlooked. E. R. Bradley has won the Derby four times and although he does not seem too well fortified in Bien Joli and Banister, remember nobody thought much of Burgoon King and Broker's Tip. The bookmakers say there is plenty of play for Banister.

One of the best juvenile sprinters of 1935—Mrs. Ethel V. Mars' The Fighter, may surprise and carry his speed the distance. Mrs. Silas B. Mason, backed three years ago when her Head Play was nosed out by Broker's Tip in that "wild west" Derby, will be represented by He Did or Voloditorian. The former won the Santa Anita derby. The remainder of the starting field will come from stables where there is more hope than class.

Cronin Fractures Thumb As Sox Trounce Athletics

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, April 16—Manager Joe Cronin stopped short-stopping for two and possibly three weeks today when he fractured his right thumb while his Boston Red Sox pounded Philadelphia Athletics for a 10-4 victory at Boston.

The mishap occurred in the second inning, just after Cronin had clubbed George Pucenelli's grounder to Ossie Melillo. Cronin covered second and took a throw for a force-play.

The high-priced manager juggled the ball before tagging out the fast-charging Higgins. Cronin did not feel the injury immediately. He then fielded Lam Newsome's drive and started a double play that retired the A's without a score.

After losing their first two games of the season by one run, New York Yankees came back at Washington to score their first victory by the same margin, defeating Washington Senators 6-5.

The Yanks connected with 15 hits off Pete Appleton, Joe Bokina and Jack Russell and the Senators collected a total of 14 at the expense of Johnny Broaca and big Walter Brown. George Selkirk, the slugging Canadian, led the attack with a home run, triple and single.

Dixie Walker, who replaced Ben Chapman when the Yankee center fielder was forced to retire in the fourth because of muscular pains in his left side, struck the deciding blow in the seventh.

Belligerents Are Fined Sharkey Arrives In Yarmouth

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) CINCINNATI, April 16—President Ford Frick of the National League served notice today that his non-fraternizing rule for players on the ball field carried no license to the athletes to swing their fists freely.

He said he fined shortstop Dick Bartell of the Giants and pitcher Van Mungo of the Dodgers only \$25 each for the fight they had in Wednesday's New York-Brooklyn game because he considered that fight "not a severe one."

Philadelphia Makes Bid For Big Bout

Philadelphia Jack O'Brien, representing Mayor Wilson, conferred with Jacobs today. Mike declined to say just what the new Philadelphia proposals were but said they were more favorable than any previously submitted.

The promoter expressed concern over the possibility of a hitch in his plans to hold the bout here. He viewed as objectionable a proposed ordinance which would have provided for a zoning system in all outdoor boxing areas. The idea was that by this method, and with tickets plainly marked as to the particular zones in which they were located, the customers would know definitely just where they were going to sit when they bought their tickets.

Chicubs Win Game Under Protest From Cards 5-3; Giants Win Third Straight

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, April 16—The name of Dean had another black mark, albeit a protested one, against it today.

Paul, like Dizzy, who lost the season opener to Chicago Cubs, weakened in the third game of the series to give the National League champions a victory over St. Louis Cardinals, 5-3 at St. Louis.

Manager Frankie Frisch, after an eighth inning row over an infield fly decision that gave the Cubs their final run, announced the Cardinals would finish the game under protest.

With the bases filled and one out in the Chicago eighth, Aussie Galan popped a fly which landed just inside the third base line. Larry French, on first, dashed for second. While he was being run down, Stanley Hack scored. Umpires ruled Galan out on the infield fly rule and French in the run-up but permitted Hack's run to count.

Cardinal batters established a two-run advantage for Paul Dean in the second but Charley Grimm's men doubted the score on them in the fifth.

New York Giants made it three straight over Brooklyn Dodgers with a 7-6 victory at New York. A double by Hank Lether in the ninth driving in the final two runs.

Van Mungo had throttled the Giants' attack after relieving Ed Brandt in the fifth, when the New Yorker bunched four hits with a walk and a wild pitch to score three runs and tie the score.

With two out in the ninth Burgess Whitehead walked and Mel Ott dropped a single in centre field. Lieber sent up what appeared to be an easy fly but Freddy Lindstrom and Jimmy Jordan collided trying to make the catch. The ball bounced free for a two-bagger, sending the tying and winning runs home.

Long range hitting off big Jim Weaver brought Cincinnati Reds their first victory of the year as they defeated Pittsburgh Pirates 7-4 at Cincinnati.

After Kiki Cuyler, the first man to face Weaver, cracked out a homer in the first inning, the Reds bunched four blows, including a homer by Ival Goodman, George McQuinn's triple and Bill Myers double, to score three times in the third. Three successive singles, a walk and a force out accounted for the fifth and sixth runs in the seventh and a pair of singles and a sacrifice added another in the eighth.

Al Hollingsworth held the Pirates to six hits, the first of which was Bud Hafey's second home run of the year in the first frame.

The Phillies beat down Boston rallies in the final innings at Philadelphia and won 7-5 before fewer than 500 fans. The Phils had a 7-1 lead in the seventh inning.

Johnny Moore started the Phils off to victory with a home run with Watkins on base in the first inning. Hal Lee hit a home run for the Bees with two on base in the eighth.
