Attend First Conference of Jr. Red Cross

Delegates from twelve high schools in the province were welcomed to the first High School Junior Red Cross Conference by Mr. Edwin C. Johnstone, president, Prince Edward Island Division, Canadian Red Cross Society. Mr. Johnstone, in his welcome, stressed the need for "service" by high school students in community activities. He expressed thanks for co-operation and assistance given in the past, especially during Blood Donor Clinics held throughout the province.

James Norton, Grade 11 student from Summerside High School acted as chairman for the day. Dr. L. W. Shaw, Chairman of the Junior Red Cross Committee for Prince Edward Island Division, was the special speaker during the morning session. The delegates were broken into discussion groups using the topics: "Organizing High School Red Cross", "Community and Provincial Projects", "Overseas Relief Projects" and "International Understanding Projects".

"The Red Cross Story" told in brief by Miss Iphigene Arsenault, Provincial Red Cross Commissioner, was followed by the film "Without Warning" which depicted over all Red Cross activities. Stresses Voters' Duty In Address At Rotary

"I urge all those who are neglecting their duty by not taking part in the government of their country, to reconsider their position", Mr. J. M. Macdonnell, M.P. for Greenwood, Toronto riding, said in a thought-provoking address before the Rotary Club at their weekly luncheon meeting yesterday at the Charlottetown Hotel.

"Many people who regard themselves as highly, neglect this duty", the speaker continued. "I would urge them not to be obsessed by party strife, which is not always carried on in the best of taste. I would urge them to remember that party warfare is the necessary accompaniment of our form of government, that the only way to maintain freedom is by having always an alternative government available in Her Majesty's Opposition. I would remind them that this is the only system devised which enables governments to be changed peacefully — by ballots and not by bullets."

Mr. Macdonnell reminded those whom he had described, that Parliament, however critical they may be of it, "is their Parliament". It consists of the men sent by the voters. If good men are sent, it will be a good Parliament and if good men are not sent, it will not be good. "But good or bad", Mr. Macdonnell concluded, "there it is from everything else it is Parliament which is the custodian, not only of its own freedom, but of the freedoms — religious freedom, the freedom of the press, the freedom of education, the freedom of speech — all the essential things of our way of life."

Mr. Macdonnell was a Brigade Major in the First World War and was awarded the Military Cross and the Croix-de-Guerre. He is Chairman of the Board of Governors of Queen's University.

Youth Cleared Of Chum's Death At Coroner's Inquest

The accidental discharge of a 16 gauge shot gun with faulty mechanism, used in the hands of a 12-year-old youth, Bruce James, was found by a coroner's jury to be the cause of the death of Preston Macdonald of Church Road who was shot on October 29 in the James farmyard. An inquest held last night in Marie School House came to the above decision. Dr. A. R. Burden of St. Peters presided; Mr. J. P. Nicholson appeared for the Crown.

Evidence disclosed that Bruce James while attempting to unload the chamber of an automatic shotgun accidentally shot the Macdonald boy who happened to be walking toward the muzzle of the gun when it discharged.

The James boy disclosed how he and young Macdonald had gone on Sunday afternoon looking for partridge. After a short time they decided to come home. The Macdonald boy had the gun in his hands and had cleared the magazine. When he attempted to clear the firing chamber of the weapon he found that he did not know how and handed it to his chum, who was more familiar with the gun, since it belonged to Bruce James' father.

Young James said that he opened the breech of the gun and was in the process of sliding the mechanism forward when it discharged. He said that the gun was not ordinarily supposed to act in this manner although he had known it to do so on at least one occasion.

THOUGH GUN CLEAR — When asked by Mr. Nicholson what precaution he would take against such an occurrence the boy replied that if he knew there were shells in the magazine, he would hold the hammer back to prevent the gun from firing. He said he was of the opinion that the Macdonald boy had removed all the shells and therefore did not hold the hammer of the gun.

Charles Albert James, father of Bruce James said that the gun was over 25 years old and had formerly been used by a deceased brother of his who was a trapper.

Also testifying at the inquest was Carl Shepherd of Milburn who substantiated the evidence in regard to the poor working condition of the weapon and James Heber Stewart who witnessed the shooting from the house. There was no variance in the evidence presented by any of the witnesses.

Dr. Burden in explaining the autopsy report said that the injuries received in the discharge of the gun had caused external lacerations and internal hemorrhages.
