

Lloyd Endorsed For Long Period

LONDON (Reuters) — Prime Minister Macmillan Tuesday endorsed reports that Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd will be relieved of his post.

Macmillan told the House of Commons that Lloyd and he "hope to carry on our work together for a very long time to come."

As a result of the prompt backing by Macmillan, Lloyd appeared to be the most secure foreign secretary Britain has had in years.

Cheers from Conservative supporters greeted the prime minister's declaration in the House of Commons.

A furor over Lloyd's future was touched off on Monday by a story in the London Times that Lloyd might be switched to another cabinet post.

CONSERVATIVE REPUTATION
The 174-year-old independent daily has a studiously preserved reputation for careful, conservative news reporting. It also is regarded as reflecting officials' view on many subjects.

The effect of the report at Geneva, where Lloyd is attending the East-West foreign ministers' meeting, was like a bombshell, but a telegram from Macmillan on Monday pledging his fullest confidence in Lloyd diminished its effects at the conference.

Nevertheless, it was feared that some Allied circles might continue to doubt that Lloyd had the full backing of his government in the current negotiations.

Labor member George Wigg protested to the Press Council, self-appointed watchdog of the British press, and Sir William Haley, editor of The Times, over the Lloyd story.

Meanwhile, the right-wing

Daily Sketch in its Wednesday edition carried an editorial saying: "The strange case of the stabling of Selwyn Lloyd cries out for an explanation. It had better be good. And it had better come from The Times."

The Geneva evening paper Journal de Geneve says the official British denial would still leave observers sceptical, believing the London report was inspired from a high level.

The Tribune de Geneve speculates that The Times, for reasons of its own, thought that there should be a change in the Foreign Office.

It says the story was "worth its weight in venom."

The Paris Conservative paper Le Figaro sees little chance of Lloyd being ousted from the post because of the prestige his "patient work in his present post has brought him in Britain."

The German Social Democrat newspaper Frankfurter Rundschau says "there must be something" in the report. The Chinese Communist New China news agency regards it as "inspired by certain British forces working hand in glove with the West German militarists."
