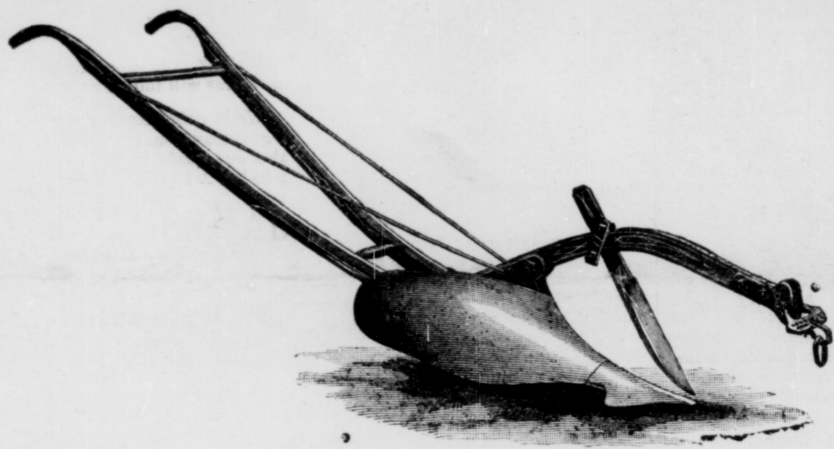

THE MURDER OF KINGS.

"THE FATAL LINE" AS IT RUNS THROUGH HISTORY AND LEGEND. The House of Stuart in Scottish and English Annals—Some Very Remarkable Facts Catalogued by a Careful Student—Curious Reminiscences. In The Free Press recently, under the head "The Murder of Kings," is a resume of some of the notable murders of civil rulers in the world's history. In speaking of the rulers of Scotland, reference is made to the murder of Duncan by Macbeth, the killing of the Red Comyn by Bruce, and of the fate of the first and the third of the Jameses in the Stuart line, which has won the title of "The Fatal Line." The catalogue is susceptible of an almost unlimited extension.

Robert Stuart, duke of Rothesay, eldest son of Robert III, and heir apparent to the Scottish crown, was seized to death by his uncle, the Duke of Albany, who sought to prevent the Duke of Albany from succeeding to the crown of his brother.

Robert III, the father of Albany, had a head for his infamous crime, adopted the middle course of sending his second son, James, to France, so that he might escape the power of his uncle, Albany, who was well treated, and educated in the learning and accomplishments of the English court, was an English wife, and had a son, James, who was well educated in the sciences and the arts.

James IV, himself fell at the fatal battle of Flodden. James V, died of a broken heart because of the treachery for want of proper support on the part of his nobles at the battle of Pinkie. Though a skilled and courageous man, his spirit seemed to have deserted him, and retiring to his palace of Falkland, he took to his bed. The intelligence was then brought him that his queen at Linlithgow had born him a heir. He inquired if it were a man-child, and being told that it was a girl, he exclaimed, "Adieu! farewell; it can't be a lass and it will gang with a lass"—meaning that as the crown came to his family through the female line it would in like manner pass from his house; upon saying which he turned his face to the wall and never awoke.

Of Mary, the daughter thus orphaned, her misfortunes and her tragic end at the order of Elizabeth of England are well known. Even though she persisted in her hope of her complicity in the murder of her husband may find satisfaction for the act in the fact that royal homicides were the rule, and that king and queen had become a virtue in Scotland. But Mary's defenders will not fall back upon this questionable plea.

James VI (James I. of England), son of Mary, though he died in peace in mature life, was yet the victim of various plots aimed against his life of liberty, notably the Gowrie plot in his own country, and the Guy Fawkes gunpowder plot in England.

The head of Charles I. fell under the ax of the commonwealth. His immediate heir, Charles II, after the restoration, was too careless and volatile a prince to incur unpopularity, and was soon to have around him a powder mill, contrived by James Hepburn, Earl of Bothwell. Bothwell himself succeeded to Mary's hand and to the title of king. Upon the death of Charles, James became king, and he was deposed and driven into exile by his son in law, William of Orange. James' descendants for two generations made efforts to recover the crown, but the last of the house took orders in the Roman Catholic church, leaving no heirs, thus closing the Stuart line of kings. In the closing chapter of the Fatal Line, the Gowrie plot in his own country, and the Guy Fawkes gunpowder plot in England.

Of those incidentally connected with the Scottish monarchy, the story is no less striking. Henry Stuart (Lord Darnley), the husband of Mary, and king by the courtesy of Scotland, was slain in the explosion of a powder mill, contrived by James Hepburn, Earl of Bothwell. Bothwell himself succeeded to Mary's hand and to the title of king. Upon the death of Charles, James became king, and he was deposed and driven into exile by his son in law, William of Orange. James' descendants for two generations made efforts to recover the crown, but the last of the house took orders in the Roman Catholic church, leaving no heirs, thus closing the Stuart line of kings. In the closing chapter of the Fatal Line, the Gowrie plot in his own country, and the Guy Fawkes gunpowder plot in England.

BEAR AND SERPENT IN BATTLE.

Description by an Eyewitness of a Scene in the Indian Jungle. How the children of East Indian jungles settle their differences was told in a letter received in this city recently from Madras, says the New York Tribune. The writer, who saw the fight, had accompanied some Chinese, who were on a hunt for game and had set a number of traps and nets. They were making the rounds of the nets when their attention was attracted by a succession of hideous noises—roars of rage and pain and a prolonged hissing, like the rush of escaping steam. They hurried to the spot and there a huge black bear was fighting for his life with an enormous serpent. The serpent had wound his giant folds around the bear, which dashed itself from side to side, and rolled over and over on the ground in frenzied endeavor to get free, roaring and snapping its jaws like castanets at the serpent's folds. It was unable to reach them however, owing to the way in which they were constricted about its body. In this way they struggled until they reached the edge of the incline, down which the bear threw himself with a speed which evidently disconcerted the serpent, for it unwound a couple of folds and threw its tail around a tree, evidently with the intention of making a dash for preventing the unpleasant consequences of a rapid tumble downhill.

This appeared like admirable strategy, but it resulted in the serpent's undoing. The rigid line of tail, straightened out from the tree to the bear's body, gave the infuriated bear a chance to seize hold of its assailant. He promptly accepted the chance, and with a tremendous effort turned and fastened his powerful jaws in the snake's quivering flesh. The hissing ceased and a moment later the hissing serpent rapidly unfolded its huge body, and struck savagely at the cleft jaws of its enemy to make it loosen its hold on the mangled mass of flesh. In response the bear with a muffled roar, kept scorching the mouthful of snake in its jaws with the oxymus of anguished rage. Once more the serpent constricted its folds, the bear howled and gasped, and both rolled, still struggling, out of view into the high grass prairie. The bear was marked with pools of blood, and when next seen they had parted. The snake, evidently badly hurt, was coiled in an attitude of defense, with his head erect, and was hissing angrily. It had plainly had enough, and was more anxious to be let alone than to renew the conflict. Not so the bear. Though nearly crushed to death, with its tongue lolling out from its blood-drenched fuming jaws, the aroused bear was full of getting another try. At Kongsagata I had only one cigar left in my pocket, which I carefully guarded during the whole of the battle as a miser guards his treasure. I did not feel justified in using it. I pointed in glowing colors the happy hour when I should enjoy it after the victory. But I had miscalculated my chances. A poor dragon lay helpless, with both arms crushed, murmuring for something to refresh him. I felt in my pockets and found that I had only gold, which would be of no use to him. But stay, I had still my cherished cigar. I lighted it for him and placed it between his teeth. You should have seen the poor fellow's grateful smile. I never enjoyed a cigar so much as that one which I did not smoke."

Tobacco as an Insecticide. The old remedy of tobacco is rapidly coming into favor again. For cheapness it can hardly be equaled, as only the refuse stems of the poorest quality need be used. In fact, these are better than the stems of fine Havana because poor tobacco contains a greater quantity of nicotine, which is the active poison that kills the insects. The decoction is made by steeping a pound of stems in a gallon of hot water. After it has cooled the liquid is strained off and applied with an ordinary spraying apparatus. Spraying with tobacco tea is recommended for the flies on tomatoes, potatoes, cabbage and radishes, also as a specific for lice, ticks and other external parasites of animals. This remedy has the recommendation that it is not a dangerous poison to have around where children and innocent animals may get at it.—American Agriculturist.

Living the Deceit. The living process is easily understood. Place the live directly under the swarm, if it clusters on a bush near the ground. Jar the limbs so the bees will fall directly on the live, and if the live is in a tree and clean the bees will not be long in taking possession of their new home. Remove at once to the place which it is to occupy in the apiary. Prepare your sections and place them in the hives when the peach begins to bloom, so as to induce the bees to go to work in the sections at once, to deposit the surplus honey. Honey is cheap, pure, sweet and healthful. It can be had for the taking of it, and is far superior in quality to the molasses that adorns so many tables, and I use no reason why the farmer should not have a bountiful supply. If you have a surplus it will bring you a neat profit when placed upon the market.—Western Rural.

Visibility of Colored Lights. A local scientist has recently made some very interesting tests with lights at sea, and declares that a white light can be seen further than any other. A red light comes next in carrying power, and green ranks third. From 60 to 80 per cent. of light is absorbed by red and 95 per cent. by green glass. The per cent. of absorption, of course, here is in ratio with the density of the color in the glass, and the condition of the atmosphere has considerable influence on the range of visibility of the lights.—Philadelphia Record.
