## Monies Reject Decision Regarding Memorial Cup

**OTTAWA (CP)** - It's Memorial Cup or bust for Ottawa Montags, Ottawa district junior hockey champions.

Monies have turned thumbs down on a Canadian Amateur Hockey Association decision that the Ottawa district, Maritimes and Quebec branches be declared out of the running for junior hockey honors and compete instead for a yet-unnamed Eastern Canada trophy.

As a result of their strong opposition to the decision, the CCHA now is trying to fit either the Montags or Maritimes champions Charlottetown Penguins into the Memorial Cup picture.

Monies and Penguins own a best-of-five series here tonight. All games will be played in the Ottawa auditorium.

Ottawa manager Ross Tyrell says he understands that the CCHA has to make the Memorial Cup contention because it didn't leave them enough time to stage their own provincial playoffs. Officials of the Ottawa district were reported to have decided to go along with Quebec and the Maritimes and stage a three-

game playoff for the new trophy. "But Monies didn't at any time agree to go along with this," says Tyrell.

Regardless of the arrangements the CCHA has to make, our club is insisting on its right to challenge for the Memorial Cup. "We intend to be counted out on the ice, not in a committee room," says the Ottawa manager.

This is the third time in four years that Monies have carried the Ottawa district banner into Memorial Cup playoffs. Each year they failed to reach the eastern final.

Monies have an impressive record both in the regular season and playoffs. In 27 league games they won 23 and lost three to finish on top of the standings. In 21 playoff games they've won 13.

The Ottawa team is a young one - Tyrell estimates the average age at 17 years.

At least two of the Montags - forwards Rod Zaine and Greg Gordon - have been invited to attend National Hockey League training camps next season.

A number of other players considered offers of local scholarships from the United States.
