LIBERAL CONSERVATIVE CONFERENCE

The Liberal-Conservative Conference of this year was, we think, decidedly the most satisfactory ever held in this Province. Many delegates attended, including some of our leading farmers and men of business and all parts of the Province were well represented. A spirit of unanimity and confidence prevailed throughout, and the proceedings were conducted upon business principles. Officers were first elected and provision made for the organization of the party throughout the country. To the end that prompt and successful action may be taken in the event of an election, it is hoped that all persons who are in favor of progress and reform, and all opponents of the extravagant and corrupt combinations now mismanaging public affairs and heaping up debt, will heartily co-operate with the conveners in their respective districts. As the Leader of the Opposition remarked at the close of the conference, we know not how soon a provincial election may take place; but we do know that there must, in any case, be an appeal to the country ere many months have passed. It is not to be supposed that Mr. Fred Peters, Q. C., will again come all the way from British Columbia to save his friends; and, if not, it is hard to see how the Farquharson Administration can continue to hold office after the meeting of the Legislature. Therefore, let the Opposition, in the country as well as in the Legislature, be ready.

The resolutions passed by the conference bore, for the most part, upon questions in which the progress and prosperity of the country are bound up,—though we are pleased to note the fitting recognition of the services of Sir Charles Tupper, and the Hon. Daniel Gordon and his supporters and the Legislature, as well as the tribute that was paid—on motion of his many-years neighbor and friend, Mr. W. E. Dawson,—to the memory of the late Malcolm McLeod, Esquire, Q. C.

There was a strong and wholesome expression of opinion concerning the political immorality of those who make promises before an election and break them afterwards. Those who protest to the electors that they will be more economical than their predecessors and prove to be more extravagant, who say that they will, in any case, make ends meet and go on to heap up a great burden of debt, who lay down one line of policy and follow another, deserve the severest reprobation of the deceived electors. There is a clear and simple method of procedure, described by the words "vote them down" and "turn them out;" and it is the duty of every honest and independent man, who desires to see his country well and economically governed to adopt it.

The resolutions passed concerning means of transport between this province and the Mainland, together with "cold storage," railway rates and winter communication, are all of the highest importance, and will, we feel sure, be agreed with by all progressive men who have the interests of this province at heart.

THE LIBERAL CONSERVATIVE CONFERENCE.

Yesterday's Afternoon Meeting—Important Resolutions Passed.

At the afternoon session the newly-elected president, Mr. Alexander Martin, M. P., took the chair. He thanked the conference for the honor that had been done him and expressed his intention of doing everything in his power to promote the interests of the Liberal-Conservative party.

Mr. Wm. Campbell, M. L. A., Hon. Daniel Gordon, leader of the opposition in this province, and Mr. J. T. Mellich, then delivered short addresses, expressing their appreciation of the valuable services rendered the party by the retiring president, Hon. Senator Ferguson, and expressing their confidence in his successor in office. Mr. Mellich moved that the thanks of the conference be tendered Senator Ferguson for his able conduct as President.

The resolution was seconded and unanimously adopted.

Hon. Mr. Ferguson made a fitting acknowledgement.

Moved by Hon. Senator Ferguson, and seconded by J. T. Mellich, Esq.—

Resolved, That we the members of the Liberal Conservative Conference of Prince Edward Island desire to record our hearty appreciation of the magnificent services rendered to Canada by Sir Charles Tupper, Bart., during an already prolonged public life all of which has been unsparringly devoted to the promotion of the best interests of our common country, and we rejoice in the fact that Divine Providence continues to vouchsafe to him so full a measure of health and strength as to justify the confident hope that his great experience, thoroughly tried honesty and unrivalled ability will be available at an early day for the position of first Minister of Canada.

Moved by Hon. Daniel Gordon, seconded by Hon. Senator McDonald,—

Resolved, That in the opinion of the members of this conference the action of the colonies in volunteering assistance to Great Britain in repelling the invasion of British territory in South Africa and in maintaining the rights of British subjects in territories within the sphere of British influence is a matter of congratulation; but we regret that this step was not taken by the Government of Canada with the same alacrity and cordiality as in the other self-governing colonies of the Empire.

Moved by Cyrus Shaw, M. L. A. and seconded by Gilbert DesRoches, M. L. A.—

Resolved, That in the opinion of the Liberal Conservative Conference of Prince Edward Island, this day assembled, it is the manifest duty of the Government of the Dominion of Canada not only to defray the expenses of all supplies, armaments and transportation of troops furnished by Canada for active service in the war in South Africa, but also to provide for the payment of all officers, men and attendants that may be deemed necessary to be furnished by Canada for the defence and maintenance of the British Empire.

Moved by John McLean, Esq., seconded by C. C. Gardiner, Esq.,—

Resolved, That the proposition of the present Government to change the constitution of Parliament by providing for a joint vote of both houses on measures regarding which a disagreement may arise would swamp the influence of the smaller provinces and imperil the constitutional right of the electorate to be applied to regarding any new and important question.

Moved by Murdock McKinnon, M. L. A., seconded by John McQuaid,—

Resolved, That the attempt made by the present Federal Government during last session to disturb the boundaries of parliamentary constituencies with the avowed purpose of promoting the interest of the dominant party notwithstanding the constitutional requirement that a redistribution based on the result of the census shall be made in less than two years, calls for our strongest reprobation, especially as the proposed changes in this Province were in violation of the principle of representation by population and were in other respects detrimental to the proper representation of the people in Parliament.
