## SPECIAL CONVOCATION

### Lieutenant-Governor To Address Graduates

Lieutenant-Governor W. J. MacDonald will address the graduates of St. Dunstan's University at the convocation exercises on May 9. It was learned last night from SDU president Rt. Rev. G.A. MacDonald. Lieutenant-Governor MacDonald will replace Governor-General Georges F. Vanier who was originally scheduled to address the graduates but who will be unable to attend because of the policy of not visiting a province during a provincial election.

Both Governor-General and Madame Vanier were also slated to receive honorary degrees from SDU.

The Governor-General expressed his regrets that he and Madame Vanier would not be able to attend the convocation, but said they were anxious to visit St. Dunstan's University and suggested they would be available later in the year.

At the present time plans are being formulated for a special fall convocation at SDU to honor Governor-General and Madame Vanier.

### Protest March Is Scheduled

SUMMERSIDE — Protesting construction workers in Summerside are scheduled to stage a protest march this afternoon at 2 o'clock. The march was originally scheduled for 10 a.m. until police advised it more appropriate to hold the march in the afternoon to avoid possible traffic congestion.

The workers continued to hold meetings throughout Friday and on one meeting as many as 80 laborers were present.

Saturday marks the fifth day of marches and meetings by protesting construction workers in this area.

### Queens MP States Views

OTTAWA—Canada may reach the point where half the population is investigating the other half, Heath Macquarrie, MP for Queens, said in the commons Friday.

"There never was a time when we had so many inquiries going and I suppose we would reach a stage of social equilibrium if half the population were investigating the other half," Mr. Macquarrie said.

He said he has heard that the universities are considering setting up a course of produce bachelors of enquiry.

Mr. Macquarrie said it was time that an all-embracing inquiry into the economy of the Maritimes and the Atlantic provinces was established.

"After watching painfully the way in which the national government has failed to show interest and initiative in dealing with the Atlantic economy, I believe the time has come to set up another royal commission so we may look with a sense of urgency at a situation where that part of Canada were confederation began to slip further back while the rest of the country gets ahead," the Queens' MP said.

### Gordon Bennett May Nominate

Gordon Bennett, 102 Upper Prince Street, has decided to offer as a probable Liberal candidate in Fifth Queens in the provincial election called for May 31. He told this paper last night.

Mr. Bennett who is the registrar and director of studies at Prince of Wales College has been active in many community organizations.

Earlier this year he was elected president of the Canadian Curling Association. He has also held top executive post in various organizations in Charlottetown. This is Mr. Bennett's first entry into the political field.

This will mean that Mr. Bennett will be allied with Elmer Blanchard, the Charlottetown lawyer who told the Guardian he definitely will offer as a Liberal candidate in Fifth Queens. Of course there may be additional nominees offer before the convention date.

Mr. Blanchard was a candidate in the previous election. Readers will recall, too, that the young Charlottetown lawyer was the efficient chairman of the Provincial Liberal leaders' hip convention held in the Confederation Centre early last December.

The Fifth District of Queens comprises that part of Charlottetown and the Royalites lying East of George Street and the Malpeque highway. The Sixth District of Queens is made up of the Charlottetown and Royal area west of that line.

### ARTIFICIAL PUMP WORKING WELL

## Heart Operation Brain Damage Anticipated Temporary Nature

By MAX B. SKELTON HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Doctors attending Marce De Rudder, 65, said Friday the former coal miner possibly suffered temporary brain damage during the six-hour operation in which he received a partial artificial heart.

"This condition has been encountered previously in open heart cases," a Methodist Hospital bulletin said.

Dr. Rudder has not recovered consciousness since the operation but the latest advisory said his lack of response is not due to the plastic heart pump that still is working satisfactorily.

"Dr. Michael DeBaKey feels his unconsciousness is possibly due to temporary brain damage," the bulletin said. "Mr.

De Rudder has been receiving the type of treatment usually employed in these cases. It is hoped that any possible brain damage and edema will be temporary."

**DOING 75 PER CENT OF JOB**

The artificial pump now is assuming about 75 per cent of the work load, normally handled by DeRudder's left ventricle, the chamber that does most of the heart's pumping. The advisory also said studies indicate the artificial pump has caused no destruction of blood.

An earlier advisory had noted DeBaKey as claiming the prolonged unconsciousness now in its second day—on edema, a brain swelling caused by an abnormally large amount of fluid.

The bulletin did not specify the type of treatment but edema sometimes is treated with a sugar substance to draw water out of the brain. Swelling can be experienced without permanent damage but a prolonged condition could cause damage.

of the normal work load of DeRudder's damaged heart. He said the implant was successful and should lead to even more dramatic developments aimed at adding years of useful life to hundreds of thousands of heart patients.

Two tubes about six inches long and an inch in diameter were implanted in DeRudder's chest and attached to the heart, thus improvising a bypass of the left ventricle, the chamber that does most of the heart's pumping work.

The dome-shaped pump, about the size of a tennis ball, was attached to the tubes but it remained outside the chest. It can be removed later without major surgery.

DeBaKey hoped diversion of much of the pumping activity to the plastic pump for a week or 10 days will permit the damaged left ventricle sufficient rest to repair itself.

### Minister Intimates Consideration

OTTAWA — Transport Minister J. W. Pickersgill has intimated that he may give some consideration to a change in ferry rates for frequent users of the service.

In discussions with Prince MP David MacDonald, Mr. Pickersgill lent a sympathetic ear to Mr. MacDonald's argument that the new schedule of ferry rates would work a hardship on truckers and other users of the ferry service who cross Northumberland Strait one or more times a day.

"Mr. Pickersgill told me that he would take another look at the decision of the CNR to do away with the return ticket on the ferries," Mr. MacDonald said. "There are many truckers and travellers who use the ferry service several times a day."

Mr. MacDonald said he has suggested that the ferry company institute a system of ticket books which would provide multiple crossings of the strait at a discount from the normal single fare rate.

Mr. MacDonald said he is hopeful that the transport minister will give serious consideration to the situation of frequent ferry users in order to reduce the financial burden which will be imposed by the proposed new rates.

### Bonny Overhaul Data Promised

OTTAWA (CP) — Industry Minister Drury hopes to make an announcement shortly on the cost of overhauling HMCS Bonaventure but he could not say Friday whether it is likely to exceed \$8,000,000.

He gave the answer in reply to a Commons question by Thomas M. Bell PC—Saint John—Albert who asked the minister to confirm reports the overhaul will cost \$8,000,000. The contract was let for \$4,900,000.

Mr. Bell noted industry department officials were aboard the carrier and he hoped they could pin down the cost. The overhaul work is being done by Davie Shipbuilding Ltd., Lunenburg, Que., which submitted the low bid.

## Gang Member In Train Robbery Reported Ready To Tell Story

AYLESBURY, England (Reuters)—A man charged with taking part in Britain's £2,600,000 (\$7,800,000) great train robbery almost three years ago has told police he is ready to tell them all about the holdup, a Scotland Yard official said Friday.

Police, meanwhile, ordered a tightening in the hunt for members of the robbery gang still missing, including two suspected leaders and two who escaped from prison after being found guilty of taking part.

The offer to tell police the details of the robbery was reportedly made by James Edward White, 46, arrested Thursday in the quiet south coast town of Littlestone, Kent.

White, arraigned Friday, was quoted by the official as having told police after his arrest:

"I am only too pleased to tell you all about it. I was on that job. I was in the coach when the money was nicked (stolen)."

The two suspected leaders of the gang—Ronald (Buster) Edwards and Bruce Reynolds—are believed living in luxury on the proceeds of the robbery.

Interpol, the international police organization in Paris, was given new information Friday in an effort to track down the and eight months after agang missing men.

Police also hoped for new tips that might lead to the recapture of Charles Wilson and Ronald Biggs, who were sentenced to 30-year terms for the robbery but later escaped from prison.
