Chelsea Wins English League Soccer Title

LONDON (AP)—Chelsea celebrated 50 years of soccer by winning the English League championship Saturday for the first time.

The hapless Pittsburgh Pirates finally won a ball game Sunday and thereby saved themselves the embarrassment of equalling one of the most dubious records in the National League book—losing the most games at the start of the season.

The Buccs had dropped eight straight before they decided Philadelphia Phillies 6-1 in the first game of a scheduled doubleheader. The league record is nine, set by Brooklyn Dodgers of 1918. The Brooks got home fifth that year, so manager Fred Haney need not give up hope yet.

Veteran Max Surkont pitched the Pirates to their first triumph of the campaign, scattering eight Philadelphia hits. Only Ed Ennis' home run in the sixth marred his fine performance.

The Dodgers, who already have set a league record for winning the most games at the start of the season, 11—they hold both the fore and aft marks—dropped No. 12, a knock-down-drag-out 11-0 decision to New York Giants that went 10 innings.

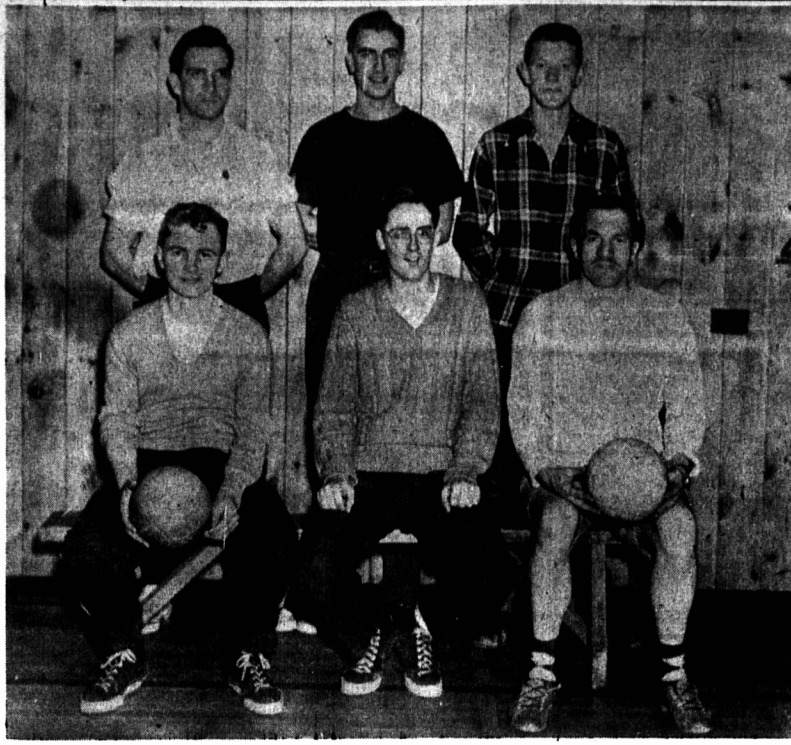

Dutchmen Defeat Beavers, Lead Allan Cup Series 2-1

KITCHENER, Ont. (CP)—Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen, sparked by forward Jack McKenzie's three goals, defeated Fort William Beavers 6-2 Saturday night to take a 2-1 lead in their best-of-seven Allan Cup final. Fourth game of the series will be played here Tuesday night.

Dutchmen, held to a scoreless tie in the first period, mounted a blistering attack in the second to take a 4-1 lead and coasted the rest of the way for the win. They out-shot Beavers 45-35.

Only four minor penalties, two to each team, were called during the game, played at near-summer temperatures. Several of the 7,344 fans were in shirt-sleeves.

Beavers dominated play, out-skating Dutchmen in the first period but they weren't able to crack a stout Kitchener-Waterloo defence. In the second, after John Irving put Fort William ahead 1-0 with a close-in shot, Dutchmen took over.

Nashua Winner Of Wood Memorial In Great Race

NEW YORK (AP)—In one of the greatest races New York ever has seen, the Belair stud's Nashua came from behind in the last strike to defeat the favored Summer Tan by a perspiring neck in the \$111,700 Wood Memorial at Jamaica Saturday.

In two weeks the pair hook up again in the \$125,000-added Kentucky Derby at Louisville, but there is little doubt that Nashua—the champion two-year old of 1954—still has the number of Summer Tan.

Summer Tan, owned by Mrs. John W. Galbreath, ruled the favorite of an excited throng of 41,721 due to a sensational work-out here last Monday. But it was Nashua from William Woodward's Belair stud, who proved he had it when the chips were down in this great 31st running of the Wood Memorial.

Nashua, sleek bay son of the imported Nasrullah, was called the problem child, unpredictable despite of his potential great promise but this was his fourth straight victory this season without defeat.

TERRIFIC DUEL As forecast, this was a duel between two terrific three-year-olds.

Vic Raschi Given Release ST. LOUIS, (AP)—Pitcher Vic Raschi, who cost St. Louis Cardinals \$85,000 last 14 months ago, was given his unconditional release Saturday.

Cardinal notified Raschi at his home in Conesus, N. Y., that clubs in both major leagues had granted waivers on him.

This means no major-league club was willing to take over Raschi's salary contract calling for a reported \$33,000. Any club could have picked up the 38-year-old righthander for \$1, plus the cost of his salary.
