Cashed Cheques 167 Years Old

The following is taken from a letter to the editor of The Pioneer, Summerside, from Mr. Edward Easton, Georgetown:

"I found in this old house of mine two Pound Notes, one on the North of Scotland Banking Company, the other on the Commercial Bank of Scotland. They belonged to John Sanderson, my great grandfather. They were one hundred and sixty-seven years old."

"I took them to the Bank of Nova Scotia at Charlottetown, and the manager was quite interested, so he forwarded them to Scotland to see if the banks were still active. The result showed that both banks were going strong. They cashed the notes. I thought this was wonderful."

"Owing to my great great grandfather having them, my grandfather had kept them as keepsakes, and they were handed down to us." Mr. Easton also mentions having in his possession, among other relics of the past, a chair 250 years old, constructed of one solid piece of wood, which was carved from a tree grown in Charlottetown where the first market building stood at that time.

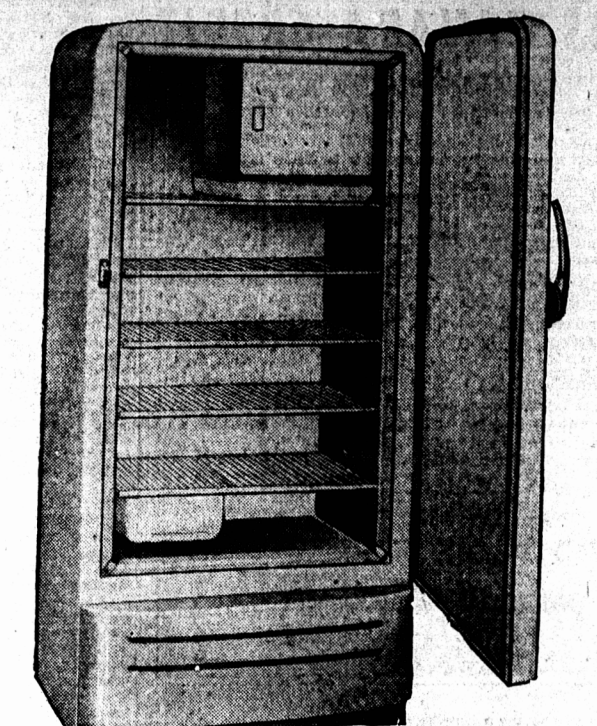
