### Side Industrial Project Said To Cost \$750,000

to the Atlantic Development Board and provincial government assistance in the development of the area. ### Kensington Retains Manning Trophy

For the second successive year the Manning Trophy goes to the Kensington area which had an attendance of 210 donors on the quota of 150 at last night's concluding Red Cross blood or clinic for this fifth and last series in 1963. This is a 140 per cent result as compared with 127 per cent in 1962, and exceeds that of Souris which is in second place by eight per cent.

Again this year the Kensington Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion sponsored the Red Cross blood donor clinic which was held in the Legion Home under the energetic chairmanship of Stewart Pappas.

A total of 305 donors registered on the 225 objective at yesterday morning's session held at the Recreation Centre of the RCAF staffed by FO Lois A. Wagner as the coordinator.

Yesterday's attendance of 415 brought the total for the four days of clinics up to 915 of the 1125 quota, or an 81.5 per cent response. This decreases the province's 100.6 per cent for the first four weeks to 92.1 per cent for the year, as compared with the 100.6 per cent record established last year.

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### City Stores Expecting Christmas Sales Boom

Charlottetown retail merchants yesterday indicated that the current outlook for Christmas sales may well result in a business boom over the season.

One dealer said "sales are coming better than last year and definitely show an improvement over past years."

None of the retailers compared the situation as being "buoyant." It looked encouraging through November since the Christmas buying has started it is exceptionally good." Most other merchants agreed that sales are ahead this year compared to other years.

To help promote Christmas, a number of stores are offering early Christmas shopping, although some are offering similar deals that each year the shopping season is advanced slightly by a couple of weeks.

Scott MacKay, president of Firestone Home and Auto Co. Ltd., said that people are "more selective in buying this year." They're making their money count more than usual and are
