OTTAWA, Oct. 26.—The new issue of postage stamps will be on sale about December 1st. The new stamps will bear in vignette a portrait of the Queen as she appears today—not as at her coronation. The color of the "ones," "threes" and "fives" will be changed in accordance with the postal union regulations to green, red and blue respectively.

Tribesmen Lose a Thousand Men

SIMLA, Oct. 26.—The losses of the tribesmen at the storming of Dagri Riage amounted to a thousand killed and wounded.

Fever at New Orleans.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 26.—Numerically yesterday was the worst day yet of the fever situation here. Fifty-two cases and eleven deaths are reported.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

Rome, Oct. 19.—The official Journal of the Vatican declares, in reference to the report that the Church will participate in future in political elections in France, that the Pope will seize every occasion to reunite all Frenchmen on a constitutional basis, in the interest of religion and society.

NEWCASTLE, Oct. 24.—Up to 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon no tidings or trace of W. C. Anslow could be found. Parties of from 20 to 30 men searched the woods for miles around, and the river for about three miles below the point where he disappeared. Everyone seems about discouraged. The citizens of Newcastle have offered a reward of \$50 and his sons \$25 for any knowledge of his whereabouts.

Boston, Oct. 24.—Lady Aberdeen, wife of the governor general of Canada, addressed a large audience in Tremont Temple this afternoon in furtherance of the project of the founding of a Victorian Order of Nurses in Canada, as a memorial of the Queen's jubilee. All the provinces were represented among the audience. Lord Aberdeen was also present and followed Lady Aberdeen in a polished and graceful address.

LONDON, Oct. 23.—Hon. W. S. Fielding yesterday afternoon received a deputation at the Canadian Government Office of English commercial houses, interested in Canadian trade. The leading textile firms were strongly requested to urge the necessity of a federal insolvency law. The deputation desired the interview made public; Hon. Mr. Fielding declined to enter the room until the press had retired. It is understood that the deputation entered a strong protest against the injustice now done to British traders in Canada. They instanced case after case in which excellent openings for British goods were neglected because the traders refused to risk the fraudulent insolvencies which they declared there was a chance to perpetrate. No Canadian legislation would be satisfactory to British creditors unless first was destroyed the validity of preferential payments to favored creditors and fraudulent settlements. Secondly, the law they asked should compel the publication of preferential assignments. Thirdly, the law should render preferential payment or assignment null, if it was made within four months of the receiving order. It is understood Hon. Mr. Fielding declines to commit his Government, but in view of the urgency of the matter, which the traders say is more important even than the preferential tariff, Mr. Fielding is expected to consult his colleagues and receive the deputation again before leaving England for Canada.
