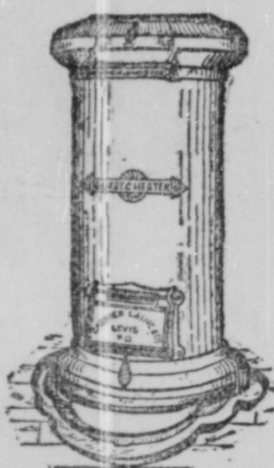

WAS WELL KNOWN HERE.—The Times reports the sudden death, about midnight, on Friday, of Mr. Morton Cameron, for some time past employed as night clerk in the I. O. R., freight shed at Moncton. Mr. Cameron was taken ill about five o'clock on Friday afternoon, complaining of pains in the arms and stomach. He was taken to his room at the Windsor Hotel, where he sank rapidly, passing away about midnight. The reports of the secretary and treasurer were submitted. During the year the society has expended about \$400 in relieving the poor, and there is a balance on hand of \$20. Mr. Henry Fitzgerald, who has been secretary of the conference for some time past, retired from the position and Mr John D Macdonald was appointed in his place. The other officers were all re-elected. During the course of the proceedings remarks were made by Dr Morrison, Senator Macdonald and Professor Caven.
