

Counterfeit \$2 Bill.

With the successful floating of the counterfeit one dollar bills, there now comes a very dangerous two, which within a very short time has been circulated and apparently to a large extent. The bill, however, is by no means as good as the \$1 in appearance, and is much more easily detected.

The latest counterfeit is a Dominion of Canada note of the July 2, 1897, series. The vignette is that of the Prince of Wales on the front, while on the back is a fishing scene. The back of the note is particularly badly printed. The color is a muddy brown, darker and less distinct than the original. The vignette of the Prince of Wales is very well done, indeed, though the letter work on both front and back is defective.

It seems the bill has been very largely circulated on the line of the Intercolonial Railway, and a number of them have come into the hands of the ticket and freight agents. In order to warn their employees against the counterfeits, the company issued the following circular: "Your attention is called to a dangerous counterfeit of the latest issue of \$2 Dominion of Canada note (Prince of Wales and fishing scene vignettes), now in circulation.

"The paper has a greasy appearance, and the words Dominion of Canada on face of note do not show up as clearly as on the genuine. The ink has a purish hue, and the letter work and vignette on back of note are much inferior to those on the genuine note. The words American Bank Note Company, Ottawa, on back of the counterfeit are poorly engraved, and irregular in line.

"A comparison of counterfeit with genuine notes will show clearly these points of difference."

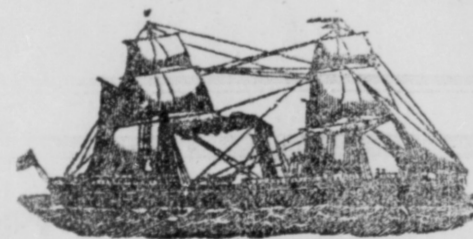
