British army in the 18th and 19th century, Kane's Lists, has this to say about him: "He saw much service in North America during the operations connected with the conquest of Canada. At one time while a lieutenant he commanded a naval force on Lake Champlain and took a French frigate of 18 guns after a close action of nearly three hours."

Lieut. Davies hoisted the first British flag in Montreal. He served as captain of a company in the most important actions of the American revolutionary war. During his long service he had command of the royal artillery at Gibraltar, in Canada and at Plymouth. He was also two years commandant of Quebec."

This was the man who turned his military skill in topographical drawing into an of-duty pastime. The 20 watercolors range in date from 1757, when as a young lieutenant, he painted a rather primitive view of Halifax, to 1812 when as a major-general he finished a more-sophisticated view of Montreal from the mountain.

Davies joins a long list of military painters of that time, but gallery officials say he has a sound claim to being the father of Canadian landscape painting by virtue of his priority in the field, his imagination and technical skill.

Whole Viet Nameese Units Deserting French, Going Over To Communists

SINGAPORE (Reuters) — Whole Viet Nameese units are deserting overnight from the French lines in the Red river delta and going over to the Communists, military observers here said Friday. The French evacuation of large areas of the rice-rich delta is the "beginning of the end" of French military operations in Indo-China, they believe.

This opinion is generally held by military analysts and diplomats whose job it is to report assessments to their home governments from this Southeast Asian listening post.

Official reports reaching Singapore describe the desertions as reaching an almost uncountable rate. "Where a few months ago defectors were in tens and twenties, in the last month on the delta they have reached hundreds and thousands."

Those who desert are officially listed by the French command as "missing."

A traveller from there said: "We used to work out Vietnamese casualties at the rate of about one killed to three wounded to about nine missing. Now whole units go missing overnight."

It is believed that the French are no longer placing reliance on Viet Nameese troops to assist in the defence of important positions.

The same traveller from the delta said "During the evacuation the French have told the Viet Nameese troops they are pulling out but the Viet Nameese can stay and defend if they so desire. The Viet Nameese do defend, well and good, but the French troops themselves are concerned only with defending the key city of Hanoi and its road and rail link with Haiphong."

ABANDONMENT BEEN The general view is that the French will abandon the Red river delta almost without a fight. The tightening of the defence ring is designed only to allow evacuation without big losses of manpower and equipment. It is believed.

It is thought the French will aim at negotiating a Korea-style line with the Communists across the centre of Vietnam.

This would mean partitioning of Viet Nam—a plan so far rejected at the Geneva talks by both sides.

IN MEMORIAM MR. J. B. MILLMAN

The death of Mr. J. B. Millman of Kensington occurred in the Prince County Hospital on June 18.

His funeral was held from St. Mark's Anglican Church Kensington on Friday afternoon, June 18, and was largely attended. In the absence of the Rector, the Rev. W. E. Ingraham, the service was conducted by the Archdeacon of the Island, the Rev. G. R. Harrison, assisted by the Rural Dean, the Rev. J. R. MacMahon of Alberton. Mr. Millman was a member of Mount Zion Lodge, A.F.A. M., and his brother Masons attended in a body.

The deceased was well known in Kensington and the surrounding country, first as a progressive farmer on the family homestead in Burlington, now the property of Col. E. W. Johnstone, then as a farmer and dealer in farm produce in Kensington for many years; after he sold this business he and his wife conducted a tourist home, "Teaholme," first on the site where the new Kensington Post office stands and later on the Malpeque Road. In all these endeavours and business relations he was fair and square in his dealings, the perfect gentleman.

In his family life he knew great sorrow, his wife, the former Annie A. Jenkins of Vernon River, died in 1932 leaving a family of five daughters. The oldest daughter, Marian, died not long after. In 1938 he married Mrs. Edith Smith of Boston, formerly Miss Edith Pillman of French River, New London, who survives him.

The surviving daughters are Mrs. Cyril Kennedy of Summerside (Annie), Mrs. Ernest Westlake of Caring Place, Ont. (Marie), Mrs. W. I. Lawson of Summerside (Jean), Mrs. Harry Laphorn of Moncton (Joyce). There are six grandchildren and one sister, Mrs. Hedley Paynter of Long River.

From early boyhood he was an active worker in the church, first in St. Stephen's Church, Burlington, where he was organist for many years, besides filling various offices. Then in St. Mark's Church Kensington he acted as vestryman and served in other capacities as long as his health permitted; he also served on the Kensington Town Council. Although he had lived a long life, he had celebrated his 84th birthday on June 6, his intellect was not dimmed, he retained his interest in community and world affairs and enjoyed discussing them with his friends.

Burial was in Kensington cemetery. The honorary pall bearers were: Eldon Campbell, John Duggan, Ernest Mill, Hedley Paynter, Preston Kennedy, Oliver Proffit and William Cousins.
