

Montague Tests New Fire Pump

The Montague Fire Department members were out on practice manoeuvres yesterday testing a new pump. Under the leadership of Fire Chief Doug Coffin, the members assembled at the wharf for firehose drill. At the same time tests were made on the new fire pump recently purchased and all were extremely satisfied with its performance. Pump No. 1 was also tested and when compared, it was found that they were almost identical in volume of water ejected.

The fire brigade now holds regular monthly meetings at which educational films on fire-fighting are shown, together with discussion on new ideas learned.

It is also understood that a map of the town will be procured, and distances will be measured from water to area locations so that the pump may be placed either at the river or at the tank, as the distance will indicate, so as to avoid any loss of time.

N. B. Drama Needs Permanent Advisor

MONCTON, (CP) — A British critic said today New Brunswick needs a permanent advisor to guide the growth of drama groups.

Andre van Gysegem, who is adjudicating the 1955 regional drama festival, said the same applied to any region the size of New Brunswick.

Mr. Van Gysegem arrived here by plane Tuesday night from Newfoundland accompanied by Richard MacDonald of Ottawa, national director of the Dominion Drama Festival.

The Briton will judge entries in the New Brunswick regional drama festival which begins a three-day run Thursday.
