## CENTRE TORONTO,

Government Majority Increased  
By Eleven Votes.

Election of Bertram the Protectionist  
Liberal.

TORONTO CENTRE, Dec. 1.—The Toronto  
bye-election yesterday resulted in the  
election of Mr. Bertram the Liberal candi-  
date by 251 majority over Mr. Howland  
the Conservative candidate. The total  
vote polled was Bertram, 2183; Howland,  
1932. The total vote polled in Centre  
Toronto at the general election was: Lount,  
(Liberal) 2394; Cockburn, (Conservative)  
2154,—majority for the Liberals 240.

## INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY.

Changes in the Staff and Other  
Changes Reported.

MONCTON, Dec. 1.—Rumors are still  
ripe here in regard to probable changes in  
the Intercolonial staff. J. T. Wallace,  
general freight agent is reduced to the  
position of assistant freight agent; and Mr.  
Pick, the present assistant freight agent  
and Mr. W. E. Price, assistant passenger  
agent, have received notice that their  
offices are abolished.  
It is reported that the majority of the  
staff in the audit, freight and passenger  
agents departments will be either dismissed  
or removed to Montreal.  
There are almost fifty clerks in these  
three offices.  
It is understood that Messrs. Pick and  
Price will be provided for in other posi-  
tions.

## BREACH OF DISCIPLINE.

OTTAWA, Dec. 1.—Hon. Mr. Blair left  
for the Maritime Provinces yesterday.  
Colonel Strathy, Commandant of the 5th  
Royal Scots, has got his conge from the  
force. His language as applied to the  
Major General commanding in a news-  
paper interview in Montreal, was received  
by the minister with the result that Hon.  
Mr. Borden, decided to retire Colonel  
Strathy from the force as soon as a transfer  
of arms can be effected.

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—Thorn has been  
found guilty of murder and his sentence  
will be received on Friday next.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

LONDON, November 29.—The estate of  
the Duchess of Teck cousin of the queen,  
and mother of the Duchess of York, who  
died on October 27th last, is valued at  
£35,471.

LONDON, November, 29.—Lawrence  
McCarthy, probably the oldest man in the  
world, and the last survivor of the com-  
batants at Waterloo, has just died in the  
workhouse at Nenagh, Tipperary, aged 115  
years. McCarthy was born in Nenagh in  
1782 and had a vivid recollection of the  
horrors of 1793. He fought at Waterloo  
where he was severely wounded.

OTTAWA, Nov. 30.—The department of  
trade and commerce has received two re-  
ports from South America, in which the  
agent deals fully with the question of the  
possibilities of trade between Canada and  
Brazil and Uruguay. In regard to Brazil,  
Sheppard says sugar, which formerly came  
from there to this country, is not consumed  
at home. About \$52,000 worth of Cana-  
dian lumber was imported into Brazil  
last year. President Moraes, of Brazil,  
did not hold out any hope of a large busi-  
ness being worked up between the two  
countries. With a Brazilian tariff of an  
average of 50 per cent it is not likely that  
a large trade is possible. In respect to  
Uruguay, Mr. Sheppard gives some infor-  
mation, in what he calls a partial report,  
but he will give his deductions later on.

ROME, November 29.—Archbishop  
Keane, former rector of the Catholic  
University at Washington, was received  
by the pope today. His Holiness con-  
gratulated the bishop upon the abnegation  
with which in a letter to the pope he had  
renounced his claim to be included in the  
list of candidates for appointment to the  
Archbishopric of New Orleans. The pope  
also congratulated Archbishop Keane upon  
the series of sermons in English which  
he commenced yesterday, upon the occa-  
sion of the advent services at the church  
of St. Silvestre Incapite, a venerable  
church of Rome, erected in honor of John  
the Baptist, a piece of whose head is still  
preserved there. The church is now in  
the possession of the English Roman  
Catholics. The subject of Archbishop  
Keane's sermon was the incarnation.

OTTAWA, Nov. 29.—The action of the  
government in deciding to reduce the rate  
on letters from Canada to any part of  
the British empire from 10c to 3c per ounce,  
will, it is estimated, entail an annual loss  
to the country of about \$50,000. Much  
speculation is being indulged in as to the  
manner in which the new move will be  
received by the home government and the  
governments of the sister colonies. In  
some quarters the opinion is expressed  
that Canada's action, taken as it is with-  
out consultation with the different colonies,  
will not be received altogether with such  
favor as may compel a reciprocal move on  
the part of the other colonies at a time  
when they were not prepared for it. At  
the meeting in London, between Mr Cham-  
berlain and the colonial premiers, the  
question of Imperial penny postage was  
under consideration, when only Cape  
Colony and Natal, declared in favor of the  
proposal, the other colonies holding the  
financial reasons would operate against  
such proposal.

PEKIN, Nov. 29.—Enquiries made here  
in Chinese official circles confirm the  
statements contained in despatches from  
Shanghai, giving the substance of the  
demands made by Baron Von Heyking the  
German minister to China as a result of  
the murder recently of German mission-  
aries and the destruction of German mis-  
sion property. Germany, through her  
minister, asks for the discovery and  
execution of the murderer of the mission-  
aries, Nies and Henle. The punishment  
of the implicated officials, including the  
governor of the Shan Tung province, in  
which part of China the mission was  
situated, the reconstruction of the  
missionary buildings, the payment of  
an indemnity of 600,000 taels to the re-  
latives of the victims, the payment of a heavy  
indemnity to cover the expenses of the  
German naval expedition and the main-  
tenance of the German force at Kiao-  
Chan Bay, the railroad monopoly of the  
Shan Tung province and the occupation of  
Kiao-Chan Bay as a German calling station.  
China will refuse the demands of  
Germany but will express willingness to  
make ampler preparation for the murder of  
the missionaries and for the damage done to  
the mission property. Russia, is understood,  
is not yet helping China, but the latter  
country has decided not to provoke hos-  
tilities and to trust to diplomacy for a  
settlement of the difficulties which have  
arisen in connection with the mission  
outrages.

There were two more severe earthquake  
shocks felt in Bucharest last week.

It is announced that experts have un-  
earthed in the colonial archives at George-  
town, British Guiana, a series of volumes  
containing memoranda, giving a running  
history of the Dutch settlement of Guiana  
from the middle to near the close of the  
seventeenth century, fully confirming the  
British boundary claims.

The American Society in London cele-  
brated Thanksgiving day by a banquet, at  
which Ambassador Hay made a humorous  
speech. A letter was read from the Queen,  
thanking the American colony for their  
Jubilee address of congratulation.
