## Rail Worker Turns Switch Wrong Way, 18 Are Killed

SPRINGER, N.M. (AP)—A railway worker threw a switch the wrong way Wednesday and sent the Santa Fe Chief plunging head-on into a parked mail train. At least 18 died.

The Chief, supposed to go westward on the main track, swerved into the bypass and collided with the sidelined mail train.

Railway spokesman said the fireman on the mail train became confused and lined the switch onto the siding instead of keeping the Chief on the main line. They added it is not unusual for the man to handle some switching duties.

J. P. Reinhold, Santa Fe Railway vice-president in charge of

public relations who was aboard the train with his family, said the fireman "threw a switch which admitted the Chief into the siding, leading to the collision."

More than 300 passengers aboard the Chief escaped without severe injury as the cars were scrambled into what a reporter described as a "fantastic accordion."

Most of those killed slept in a dormitory car. At least seven were injured.

**HARD TO FIGURE**

Reinhold said the throwing of the switch was "just one of those things that is hard to figure out. He (the fireman) just does not know why he did it."

The official identified the fireman as P. C. Caldarella of Raton, N.M.

All 312 passengers aboard the Chief were accounted for, Santa Fe spokesmen said. The dead were four crew members and 14 waiters and lounge car attendants on the Chief.

John B. Curtis, Associated Press writer, said the cars were "mangled, twisted and standing on end. Women's shoes, bedclothing and suitcases are strewn every place."

Of the 13 cars on the Chief, only seven remained on the track.

The crash occurred in the pre-dawn darkness on a flat stretch of gently rolling grazing land.
