1,574 STUDENTS ELIGIBLE

Provincial Exams Start Monday At Ten Centres

A total of 1,574 Prince Edward Island students will be writing examinations Monday through Friday next week in ten Island centres from South to Tignish, it was announced last night.

The students will be from grades ten to twelve with 922 in Grade 10; 366, grade 11 and 288 grade 12.

Merritt Callaghan will be the presiding examiner at Tignish where 85 students will write examinations; Thomas Hall at Souris with 117 students; Claude W. Wood at Summerside with 300 students; Millar MacFadyen at Kensington with 196 students; C. Braden Jelly at Kinkora with 95 students; E. Wilson Ross at North Rustico with 62 students; Gordon Bennett at

Charlottetown with 371 students; Louis F. Herring at Morell with 76 students; Harold Hynes at Montague with 177 students and 219 students at Montague under the supervision of Dr. J.C. Murphy.

In addition, approximately 40 students in grades 11 and 12 will write certain examinations as supplementaries.

Shipping Service To North Begins

The Motor Vessel Fauvette of the Canada-Newfoundland Steamship Line will arrive in Charlottetown over the weekend and begin loading cargo for Goose Bay on Monday morning.

Acquisition of the ship was arranged through APEC after a trade mission to Canada's far north was undertaken this spring. Dr. Frank MacKinnon, president of APEC said last night that the ship will tie up at the wharf

of Buntain and Bell who are the Charlottetown agents.

He said it was hoped that the island would supply 50 tons of the ship's cargo but thought 40 tons was all that was offering for the moment.

It is expected that APEC representatives along with local dealers will be on hand Monday to give the inauguration of this northland trade a good send off. Dr. MacKinnon said.

New Garage To Be Built

Construction of a new highway garage to replace the present structure at the rear of Court House in Summerside was announced yesterday by Hon. George MacKay, minister of public work and highways.

Mr. MacKay said that due to the increase in the number of snow ploughs based in Summerside, existing facilities have become too small to house them and provide space for repairs.

"Rather than enlarge the building in Summerside where space is limited, Mr. MacKay said, we exchanged the Summerside lot with the Canadian Legion for a spacious plot on the corner of the Green and Pope roads outside Summerside town limits."

The M.F. Schurman Co. of Summerside have the contract as getting started on the construction of the new steel garage, 120 x 50 ft on a concrete foundation on the new site. The property will be surrounded with a chain link fence to provide safe storage space for all types of construction materials and machinery.

Kinkora Youth Pleads Guilty

A youth who gave his address as Kinkora entered a plea of guilty to the charge of breaking, entering and theft, when he appeared before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, QC, in Queens County Magistrate's Court, yesterday afternoon.

The accused is specifically charged with having broken into a home in Crapaud and stolen a quantity of clothing valued at less than \$50. Information disclosed that at the time of the offence the accused was under a two-year suspended sentence which he received in the Summerside court on a conviction for breaking and entering.

The magistrate remanded the accused until next Friday, for sentence.

A Central Royalty youth previously remanded without plea on a charge of indecent assault, entered a plea of guilty and was given a similar remand for sentencing.

A resident of Gasperaux convicted on the charge of driving a motor vehicle while disqualified was given a fine of \$50 and costs or 30 days in jail. Convicted of speeding a fine of \$10 and costs or five days was imposed upon a Charlottetown resident.

Fines of \$5 and costs or five days were imposed on residents of Summerside, Morell and Milton for failing to stop at a stop sign. On charges of operating motor vehicles with defective equipment (lights, etc.) similar fines were imposed upon a Murray River resident and one from Middell.

A fine of \$10 and costs or five days was given to a Bedford man for failing to report to the RCMP for the purpose of having his vehicle inspected for defects which he had previously been instructed to make good. For a similar offence a Milton resident was fined \$5 and costs.

A Fredericton resident convicted of the possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than his residence, was given a fine of \$20 and costs or 30 days.

Distinguished Veterinarian Will Address Island Breeders

The guest speaker at the 2nd annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Artificial Breeders' Association will be Dr. James Arnold Henderson, president of the Canadian Veterinary Medical Association.

The meeting will take place Monday evening at 8:30 in Birchwood High School, Frank Jardine of Wilnot Valley is president.

Dr. Henderson was in charge of the first co-operative artificial insemination association in the United States at Flemington, N. J.

In June, 1938, Dr. Henderson accepted a position in the Department of Animal Pathology, University of Illinois.

In October 1941, he obtained leave-of-absence from the University of Illinois to enter the R.C.A.F., and he completed navigator's training September, 1942, and was commissioned and went to England in October, 1942.

In January 1943, Dr. Henderson was assigned to School of Agriculture, Cambridge University in an advisory capacity in connection with their artificial insemination program. He remained there until November 1944, at which time he was assigned to the Milk Marketing Board, Thames Ditton, Surrey, to assist in planning and administering their artificial insemination program. He returned to Canada, September 1945 and resumed position with University

of Illinois on November 1, 1945.

In July 1946, Dr. Henderson joined the department of medicine and surgery at the Ontario Veterinary College of which he became head in 1950.

In 1958 he became president of the Canadian Veterinary Medical Association and also Secretary of Semen export Committee of Ontario Artificial Breeders Association.

Mr. MacKay said the Commercial Road between Alliston and Montague will be paved this summer by Matheson and MacMillan. The tenders were opened in Highways Minister, J. George MacKay's office at noon yesterday. The low bid of the Island Construction Company was for \$180,910.

Paving Contracts Are Awarded

In spite of the expanded production, it was necessary to ration copies of the Scriptures to the missions last year. Rev. E. M. B. Wheelock, district secretary of the British and Foreign Bible Society, stated here yesterday.

Rev. Mr. Wheelock was addressing the 92nd annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island United Baptist Association held at the First United Baptist Church with Rev. Keith R. Hobson of Summerside presiding.

The district secretary told the meeting the literacy was growing rapidly and that there were no less than 30,000 literacy centres in India.

Circulation in Equatorial Africa, he said, has increased 400 per cent in 20 years. There are half a million children in the Christian schools in the Congo alone learning to read.

The Bible Society, Mr. Wheelock continued, is able to provide enough books, but resources lag behind in subsidizing these books to the point where the people can afford to buy them. The situation is urgent as tensions are growing in many areas which may close their doors in the future, he said.

Last year the British and Foreign Bible Society shipped over 4,000,000 copies of the scriptures from the Bible House in London. These were in 359 languages and sent to 53 different countries.

At the opening of the meeting, welcome was extended on behalf of the entertaining church by Walter Baker, B. C. Wood responded.

SESSIONS CONTINUE
Dealing with the theme, "Advancing Through Evangelism," the three-day meetings here providing informative and inspirational to all attending.

The devotional speaker for the sessions is Rev. R.J. Foster, pastor of the North River Baptist pastorate. Mr. Foster declared that the Peace promised by Jesus to his followers was more than a negative state. "It is a rich, positive, spiritual quality of life enabling the recipient to find strength in the presence and power of the living Christ," he said.

During the afternoon devotional service, Mr. Foster stated that "if we only knew how much God wants to impart himself to us we would be seeking his blessing continually and would let his spirit manifest itself through our personality."

Special speaker at the BYPU evening rally was Rev. Eugene M. Thompson, field representative of the Baptist Board of Christian Education.

MISSIONARY TO SPEAK
During this morning's session, an address will be given by Rev. Walter Ridgway, missionary to Bolivia. At this afternoon's session of the Women's Missionary Society, Miss Martha Spragg, missionary to India, will be the speaker. Allison MacKinnon will be the special speaker at the Men's Association meeting.

The Acadia Quartet will be in attendance at he Saturday evening and Sunday afternoon sessions. Sunday morning and evening they will be at Dundas and New Glasgow respectively and from June 22 to 23 they will be at East Point, Murray River, Hazelbrook, North River, Summerside, Central Bedouque and O'Leary.
