

# Alberton Receives Payment From Gov't

ALBERTON — Routine town business was carried out at the regular meeting of Alberton Town Council last night when Mayor Roy Leard presiding and all councillors present with the exception of John Profit.

Bills amounting to \$500.33 were approved and ordered paid. A cheque for \$5122.69 was received from the provincial government representing 60 percent of the cost of the 1963 street paving program.

The mayor and several councilors plan to attend the annual meeting in Summerside on May 7 of the Federation of Mayors and Municipalities and Mayor Leard will also attend an executive meeting of the federation Wednesday in Charlottetown.

A letter was received from G. Claude Smith, director of town planning during the mayor and council to give leadership to a town wide clean-up and landscaping program during Centennial year. A clean-up week will be announced at a later date.

The need for a dentist was discussed and the town clerk was instructed to write the Maritime Dental Association for suggestions or information.

Cedric Hunter and Henry Wallace were appointed assessors for the current year. It was pointed out that routine painting or exterior building repairs or beautification of grounds does not mean an increase in taxes.

The police report listed six convictions for intoxication and four for creating a disturbance. The policeman was asked to advise storekeepers that it is illegal to sell tobacco in any form to children under the age of 15.

A complaint was received regarding the large number of advertising signs at the town limits on Church Street and the matter is to be investigated.

Plans call for several other projects such as 15 camp sites, yacht club and development of a half-mile of beach.

The proposed tourist center is about 12 miles from Charlottetown directly opposite the camp site on Robinson Island in Rustico Bay.
