LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

GUY FOWLES DAY.—to day.

TONIGHT.—Frankie at the Opera House

THE FASTNET will be due here at seven this evening. She sails at midnight for Halifax.

FOOTBALL.—The Abegweits and the Prince of Wales College team will play a match game of football next week, probably on Friday or Saturday afternoon.

THE WEATHER.—Fine to-day, the winds increasing to strong breezes or moderate gales from the east and south and becoming showery on Saturday.

LAST TRIP.—The Halifax will make her last trip from Charlottetown for this season on the 26th inst. She will leave Boston on the 23rd.

I. O. O. F.—Wildy Lodge meets tonight at 8 o'clock. Degree work. All members of the Pictou degree team are requested to be present.

LIQUOR REGULATION ACT.—A summons charging a violation of the Liquor Regulation Act has been served on John Offer. It is returnable on Monday. John is charged with selling within the prohibited hours between Saturday night and Monday morning.

FIRE NEAR MONCTON.—Fire destroyed two barns belonging to Elias Rogers at Indian Mountain, parish of Moncton, on Monday afternoon. The fire is supposed to have been caused by spontaneous combustion, caused by hay heating in one of the barns.

PINE HILL COLLEGE.—Pine Hill Presbyterian College, Halifax, was opened for the season on Wednesday. It is the intention to erect a fireproof library building near the college, to cost about \$14,000. The building this year is crowded with students.

THE BOSTON BOAT.—The steamer Halifax arrived from Boston via intermediat ports last night, and left on return this afternoon about two. Her inward passengers were: Miss Jessie D Buchanan, Miss Sarah McRae, M Sullivan, Mrs M A Rudolph, Mrs Geo Hillard, Mr Steele and wife, Geo Scantlebury, H F Larkin. Her outward passengers were: Daniel McDonald, Joseph Jackson, Miss Dewar, B McQuillan, Pope Clarke, Thomas Flynn, Miss Lizzie Vanderstine, and Miss Bessie McLaughlin.

"TRUE BLUE," a drama of the Cuban-Spanish war was presented by the Frankie Carpenter Company last evening before a good-sized audience. The play abounds in dramatic climaxes and several curtain calls were received. The comedy scenes of Miss Frankie and Mr. Gray were well received, Miss Frankie appearing as Katerina Krousemier, a German emigrant girl. She was irresistibly funny, her German song and dance in the second act being especially good. The supporting company is very strong and well sustained the different characters intrusted to their care. This evening as a special feature, Miss Frankie will repeat her beautiful kaleidoscope dance. A special matinee for ladies and children is announced for Saturday afternoon to which the admission will be only 10 cents to all parts of the house.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—Two young men named Houston, sons of Mr. James Houston the well-known tinsmith and plumber, had a narrow escape from death yesterday afternoon. It seems that the two men were working in one of the small hermetically-sealed compartments of the new pork-packing establishment, doing some soldering, when they were overcome either by the fumes of the charcoal in the fire-pot or the acid they were using, and rendered unconscious. When discovered one of the men was almost dead, his body being rigid and his teeth set, and the other was frothing freely at the mouth. Dr. Beer was summoned and did everything in his power for the unfortunate men. About six o'clock they were taken to the Prince Edward Island Hospital where the work of resuscitation was continued. Today they are reported doing fine and will probably be removed to their home this evening.

LAI D TO REST.—The funeral of the late Mrs. Patrick Keough, whose very sudden death at her residence, Albany, on last Sunday, has been already mentioned in THE EXAMINER, took place yesterday morning. A large number of her friends and neighbors accompanied the remains to Kinkora, where a Requiem Mass and funeral service was performed by Rev. Dr. Doyle, her former pastor and a great friend of the family. Her body was placed side by side with that of her late husband in the cemetery at Kinkora, there to await the general resurrection. Mrs. Keough was a good wife and mother, and was very much respected by all who knew her. Her family consisted of fourteen children—nine daughters and five sons—of whom eight daughters and two sons survive her, all of whom are in the United States, where they have succeeded in making comfortable homes for themselves and are highly respected by those who know them.

SUPREME COURT.
FRIDAY, NOV. 5.

Before the Chief Justice, Mr. Justice Hodgson and Mr. Justice Fitzgerald.

Henry W. Turner vs. Benjamin Rogers, jr.—Tried before the Chief Justice, when judgment was given for the plaintiff for \$110, price of a horse and harness sold to defendant. Mr. McLean, Q. C., for defendant, today moved for a rule nisi to set aside the judgment and for a new trial on the grounds that it was against law and evidence. After hearing Mr. McLean the Court unanimously refused the rule. The Chief Justice said he adhered to the decision already given by him. The Master of the Rolls was of opinion that no other decision under the facts of the case could have been given. The Vice-Chancellor concurred, and was also of opinion that there were no grounds for disturbing the Chief Justice's decision, and agreed in refusing the rule.

The Court then adjourned until Wednesday next at eleven o'clock.
