Prince Co. Leather Road May Be Reality By '965

The newly proposed all-weather highway, still in the planning stages, may possibly become a reality come spring 1965.

At a regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade held last evening, President Earl Cannon felt

confident of the matter. "I am pretty sure," he said, "we will have our all-weather highway." No further announcement on the project will be made, however, until a conference is completed in Ottawa, it is learned.

The planned road would be constructed in Prince County and would follow a route from Charlottetown to the corner between the road to Traveller's Rest, continue westward taking in St. Eleonora, Miachook, Summerside and the present highway leading to Reid's Corner.

Proposed Water Rate Changes To Be Taken Under Advisement

Sidear at the hearing of the town council, members of the town council, local merchants and interested citizens were told here yesterday by the Public Utilities Commission at a hearing on amendments to the town interim water rate schedule, that the most commission could do was take the matter under advisement.

Commission chairman Judge St. Clair Trainor made this announcement after some 2 1/2 hours of testimony which included a submission for the town by Town Manager Joseph A. Brophy along with a question and answer period and statements by a number in attendance.

The submission requested that an amendment be made in the metered rates only for the town. The interim rates which had been put into effect early this year are as follows: 60 cents per 1,000 gallons for the first 100,000 gallons; 30 cents per 1,000 for the next 100,000 and 5 cents per 1,000 for all over 200,000.

Among the persons addressing the board at the hearing was T. Earle Hickey, who suggested that: 1. If there was any profit element in the electric charge to the water and sewerage utility it should be eliminated; 2. That an item in excess reserved for equipment should be included when computing the rates; 3. That the depreciation rate be based on the life of the plant rather than on depreciable retirement and interest which is over a 20-year period.

The commission chairman felt that the points well taken and suggested the town study these proposals and present the commission with an addition to its submission in the near future.

Former Mayor J. Ernest Morrison asked if the commission had ordered the Town of Summerside to give a breakdown of the town water utility system prior to the introduction of the present rates and after consideration of the proposal. A member of the commission, answered that the board had ordered the town to give a breakdown.

Asked what his personal future is likely to be now that the content of the conference are all but concluded, Mr. Shaw said he was only looking forward to the next visit of the Queen. Not satisfactory

He stated however, that after the hearing had been completed, the 1965 statement from the town utility, the commission had written the town and stated that it was obvious that the financial situation of the utility was not satisfactory and asked the town what it was going to do about it.

The third member of the commission, Mr. Ives, in further clarification, stated that the town had not introduced the rates; that it had made a proposal for new rates and that the commission had approved it.

Other persons addressing the hearing were: Earl Cannon, president of the Summerside Board of Trade; Angus Hubley, manager of Perfection Dairy here; Russell Phaneuf for Jenkins Bros., Councilors George Key Jr. and D. Alex MacIe; and Eldon Hickey and Malcolm Steele.

EXTREME CONCERN

All representatives of firms showing extreme concern over these present rates and it was stated that the rates put some of the businesses in precarious financial positions.

Mr. Brennan told the hearing he was confident that "when the engineering survey rates come in you will find them comparable to other communities in the Maritimes".

In closing remarks Mayor W. E. Jenkins felt the present

situation "arose from years ago" and that it was due to the town not following the trend. "I feel that as men here in business," he added, "we realize the right and wrong and that the problem should be looked at squarely and without animosity".

He expressed his hopes "that the hearing will relieve the situation".

NOT CONCERNED

Rather than being broken down in two blocks of 60 cents and 30 cents the proposed rates are scaled down gradually in three blocks as follows: 40 cents per 1,000 gallons for the first 100,000 gallons; 30 cents per 1,000 for the next 100,000 gallons and 5 cents per 1,000 for all over 200,000.

The proposed new rates would be in force only until such time as the rates of Engineering Survey Ltd., who have been hired to conduct a survey, are presented early in the new year.

The amended rates would keep the water and sewerage utility within its budget for 1964, Mr. Brophy stated.

NOT CONCERNED

Judge Trainor said it was not the concern of the commission whether the interim rates were ed hardships on the industries and it was not in the position to yield to the remarks that the rates were adverse to business.
