Island Odds And Ends

Within three or four days after the announcement had been made, that work was about to start on the T. Eaton building in Charlottetown, more than 200 applied at the Charlottetown National Employment office for work on the building. Practically all of these were men drawing Unemployment Insurance benefits. The same rush for work was experienced when the High School job was started some weeks ago. Not only were most of the men very anxious for employment, but some of them were considerably riled because they had not been selected for one of the limited number of vacancies.

This experience disproves the oft-repeated complaint of the unemployed that those drawing benefits do not want work. The truth is, that a small percentage of claimants are not anxious for casual employment, that is, jobs lasting two or three days. But the overwhelming majority will accept gladly any employment which promises to last a reasonable length of time. Any benefit claimant who is remembered, can be disqualified from receiving benefits by refusing an offer of suitable employment. It is not practical or course to offer an out-of-work stenographer or a sales-lady, a job as a domestic, nor a bookkeeper employment as a laborer.

It can be said, that since Unemployment Insurance became operative in Canada that the employees' expectancy is no longer the employers' opportunity to hire men on practically the employers' own terms.
