Branch Technologists Hold Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the P.E.I. Branch of the Canadian Society of Laboratory Technologists was held at the Health Centre in Charlottetown with 34 members in attendance.

The president, William Macdonald RT, reviewed the increased activities of the local branch during the past year and extended a vote of thanks to the 1965 executive.

Future activities on a national level were outlined by Edward Gillin, B.Sc., A.R.T., the provincial director on the national executive.

Elected to the 1966 executive were: president, William Macdonald RT; vice-president, Sandra White RT; secretary, Stanley MacNair B.Sc. RT; treasurer, Louise Anderson RT; public relations, Maureen Fisher RT; directors, Alice Clements RT, Myrna Johnstone RT, Joyce Clark RT and Jean Kitson RT.

The annual banquet, held at the YMCA, followed the meeting and was chaired by the president William Macdonald.

A. R. Shearer BA, L.C.S.L.T., the executive secretary registrar of the Canadian Society of Laboratory Technologists in Hamilton was the guest speaker. He re-

viewed the rapid development and growth of the society from its meager beginnings in 1937, focusing special attention on certification at the advanced level.

Mr. Shearer, who recently completed a cross-Canada trip, emphasized the increasing overall need in Canada for medical laboratory technologists.

Board Of Trade Views Education

KENSINGTON — In the absence of the acting president, Don Wood, Keith Harrington presided at the general meeting of the Kensington Board of Trade Wednesday night.

Public affairs chairman Lloyd Lockerby commented on a report of the financing of higher education. He said that the increase in enrollment in higher education is fantastic.

A second report was titled, "Education In The Atlantic Provinces" and dealt with problems arising annually in regard to education.

George Howatt, chairman of the committee on Agriculture said that a report referring to adult education is to receive further study.

Rev. Dr. L. P. Callaghan, chairman of the transport committee, commented favourably on a new strip of pavement in the Kensington area.

After some discussion on centennial projects a motion was passed that the board hold itself open to any approach from a centennial committee requesting its support.

A letter from Alf Parkes, executive secretary of the Maritime Board of Trade was read.

The board discussed the proposals presented by Rudy Balenbach, representative of ARDA, stating that any small group can have a course on any subject it wishes under the Agricultural Development Program.

The meeting asked that the council meet in the near future to discuss the program.

Famed Artillery Outfit Sailed 50 Years Ago

It was just 50 years ago today, on November 26, 1915, the famed artillery outfit, the 2nd Battery, sailed from here to Picton en route overseas to take their part in the First World War.

They arrived in Halifax that night and early the next morning were on the Atlantic heading for England.

In command of the battery was Col. A. G. Peake and his second-in-command was Capt. W. B. Prowse. Col. Peake returned

some time later to organize the 8th Battery and when the 2nd came home for discharge on May 10, 1919, it was commanded by Col. Parker Hooper.

Approximately 207 men of all ranks were in the unit and though it was practically impossible to keep track of all the originals because of replacements and postings it is believed only about 30 were killed in the war. The first such casualty was Walter Lantz. The unit had arrived in France June 1, 1916, with the British Army as there was no Canadian artillery then.

Many of the veterans of the 2nd Battery are still living in Charlottetown today. Among them are such well known city men as 'Bob' Nicholson, who was wounded on the Somme, Clive Currie, Phil Holland, Albert Dinis, Col. F. B. Conrad and many more.

Bermuda Flights Begin Dec. 14

A new wintertime thrill for those seeking relief from ice and snow will materialize Dec. 14 when Air Canada sends the inaugural flight of its new weekly return service from Halifax to Bermuda.

However, that thrill will be available to a select group before it is available to the public. The first of such planned flights will leave Halifax Dec. 3 with a load of government heads, boards of trade, newspaper publishers and radio and television station managers. The return flight will be made Dec. 7.

The regular schedule call for the Vanguard flight from Halifax to the mid-Atlantic paradise to cover the 870 air miles in less than three hours. The cost for a first class return flight is \$198 but there is also an economy excursion rate of \$108 in effect from Nov. 1 to March 15.

Prior to inauguration of this route Maritimers wishing to fly to Bermuda had to take the much longer route via Montreal or Toronto.

Island Airman Cited For Valor

SUMMERSIDE — Flying Officer Donald F. Parker has been awarded the Air Force Cross for gallantry of the highest order. Now a student at St. Dunstan's University, Charlottetown, FO Parker is a native of North Wiltshire, P.E.I.

In April 1963, FO Parker was the navigator of a CF 101B aircraft and during the flight he noticed his pilot had taken ser-

iously ill. With complete disregard for his own safety he elected to stay with the aircraft and pilot. Through sheer devotion to duty and loyalty to his pilot he was able to direct and guide the pilot back to base and subsequent landing.

The investiture will be held at Government House by the Lieutenant-Governor of Prince Edward Island at 2 p.m. on Monday, Nov. 29. It is understood that Premier Walter Shaw, Mayor Walter Cox and other military and civilian dignitaries expect to attend.

Island Native Dies In U.S.A.

Sister Mary Damien, Sacred Heart Home, received word of the death of her older brother, Ben McKearney, Wednesday in a nursing home in Lindenville, Vermont.
