Voters' Lists have been prepared for the Civic Election to be held on Wednesday, February 12th, 1958, and will be posted for inspection of all electors at the City Court Room, City Building, up to and including Monday, February 10th, 1958 from 11:00 A.M. to 5:30 P.M. daily.

QUALIFICATIONS OF ELECTORS

- All persons, especially wives or husbands qualified to vote under (b) below, and non tax payers such as men aged over 60 voting on rental qualifications only, should see that they are registered with the Electoral Officer in order to have their names on the Voters' List.
- All voters qualified as below must be 21 years of age, residents of the City for one year, (except non residents occupying business premises); Canadian citizens, and not in arrears of taxes at December 31st. Qualified voters, subject to above, are:
- Owners or joint-owners (for three months previous to election day) of real estate in the City to the extent of \$500.00 assessed value.
 - Wife or husband of such an owner if the owner be entitled to vote.
 - Men renting premises in the City of a yearly rental of at least \$100.00 and having rented such in the City for the three months previous to Election Day.
 - Women who have been assessed for past year for Civic Taxes and not in arrears as above.
 - Men and women who have paid Educational Tax for the past year.
 - Non-residents of the City if otherwise qualified as above and doing business and occupying business premises in the City.

MULTIPLE VOTING

Persons voting on (a) (b) (c) (d) or (f) above may vote in each Ward in which they are so qualified.

Persons voting on (e) above may vote only in the Ward of which they are a resident.

Property or rental qualifications having removed to another Ward within three months next preceding date of election, entitles vote in the former Ward only.

Want Larger Units Tried On Experimental Basis

The Public Attitudes Committee waited on the Premier A. W. Matheson and the Honourable Keir Clark yesterday afternoon. Discussion took place regarding the establishment of experimental larger units of Administration of schools combining districts where no building program was immediately needed.

Other matters discussed were a larger proportion of public moneys to improve the educational system by providing additional supervisory teachers for rural schools, a better scale of salaries for teachers and lastly the help which a Royal Commission could play in educating public opinion and assuring economical spending of additional revenue on the schools.

The Public Attitudes Committee has representatives from the following organizations: Prince Edward Island Home and School, Teachers Federation, Federation of Agriculture, Women's Institutes, Catholic Women's League, Board of Trade, Canadian Legion.

"Y" Financial Needs Explained

In connection with the annual financial campaign of the Charlottetown Y.M.C.A., Mr. Ben E. Rogers, Manager of the Bank of Montreal and Chairman of the Finance Committee, in an interview yesterday, stated that contributions being received are highly encouraging.

Mr. Rogers said that in his opinion it is a remarkable thing that only \$47,000 of the original cost of \$250,000 for the building erected in 1947, remains unpaid. However, the interest on this amount added to the annual maintenance deficit is an added drain on the finances.

TO SERVE YOUTH

When asked the reason for the annual deficit, Mr. Rogers explained that the Charlottetown "Y" like all others was designed to serve youth through providing programs for their spiritual, mental and physical development and the fact that hundreds of boys and girls under the age of 18 take part in the weekly activities in addition to several hundred young adults, is evidence that our "Y" is going a long way toward fulfilling its purpose.

NOT FEES ONLY

"However, it was never the intention," said Mr. Rogers "that a Y.M.C.A. should be self-supporting by the fees collected from children. If that were done (Continued on page 15)
