The magistrates and inhabitants of Newcastle, Miramichi, presented a very complimentary address to Capt. Grant, commanding the Light Company of the 90th regt., just before he left their town, to join the head quarters of his regiment at Fredericton. It will be recollected that Captain Grant was sent to Miramichi, to protect the peaceful inhabitants from the ravage of a mob.

Peter G. Chandler, lately convicted at St. Louis of throwing overboard the Engineer of a steambot, and allowing him, has been sentenced to five years imprisonment in the Penitentiary.

GVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA.—The following Gentlemen's Gazette announces that there is a rumour that Lord Granville Somerset is likely to succeed Lord Dalhousie as Governor General of India.

DOCTOR WOLFF, the celebrated Missionary has left England on his humane mission of attempting to rescue Colonel Hart and Captain Connolly from captivity in Bokara; who, although reported to have been cruelly murdered, are thought to be still alive. Two other officers of the British Army, Lieutenants Balfour and Baillouf, are also said to be captive in that country.

The Revenue returns of the year published, exhibit an increase of nearly six millions.

BURGLAR SHOT.—An attempt was made in New York, on the night of the 1st instant, to enter the house of a Mrs. Thorpe, 319, Broadway. It appears that a nephew of Mrs. Thorpe, by name Roggen, was awakened by the noise of some person sawing at the shutter of his room window. He waited a short while till the burglar had accomplished the work he was at, and was about to get in the window, when Mr. Roggen discharged one of Colt's five-barreled pistols at him, which took effect. The wounded man was carried off by a comrade. *The N. Y. Sun says:—*

“Mr. R. discharged at him the contents of five of the barrels. The second discharge was followed by an ‘Oh!’ and the rascal dropped. We learn from the Argus of yesterday morning that there is every reason to believe that Ashley was the person shot, and the body probably thrown into the canal basin by his comrades.

A man named Silliman, above alluded to, who boarded with Ashley, had been committed upon the testimony of the wife of the latter. Mrs. Ashley stated that she retired about one o'clock, leaving her husband and Silliman in the store, both sober; that about three o'clock Silliman came home, perfectly sober, and informed her that her husband was ‘dead and drowned?’ in the basin. Her evidence was sustained by her niece, who boarded in the house; and Silliman was accordingly imprisoned to await the recovery of the body, for which the city authorities were searching.

A Stockholm letter states that the town of Egersure (Norway) was entirely destroyed by fire on the 4th ult.
