## Roderick Pratt, St. Peters Heads Second Kings PC Ass'n

Roderick Pratt, St. Peter's Bay, was elected president of the 2nd District Kings Progressive Conservative Association at the association's annual meeting held recently.

Guest speakers were Premier Walter R. Shaw, Industries and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossiter and Walter Dingwell, M.A.

Resolutions passed at the meeting called on the government to change its farm credit policy to broaden the terms of farm loans and also to amend the act under which the Farmers' Loan Board operates to reduce the down payment on income boats to 30 per cent from 50 per cent.

Premier Shaw in his speech was critical of policies of the federal government, particularly in the agricultural and financial policies that affect this province as quickly as possible.

Mr. Rossiter dealt with his department's resources development program, industrial development program, as well as the provincial fisheries policy. He outlined at the federal program of "designated areas" which qualify for incentives for industry, pointing out that this province did not receive any "designated areas."

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## P.E.I. Churchmen Planning Crusade

Some 70 island churchmen met yesterday at Hearst Hall, Charlottetown, with Rev. Joseph D. Bilco, from the Billy Graham team, Minneapolis, Minn., to discuss plans for an eight-day crusade which Mr. Bilco will conduct here next summer.
