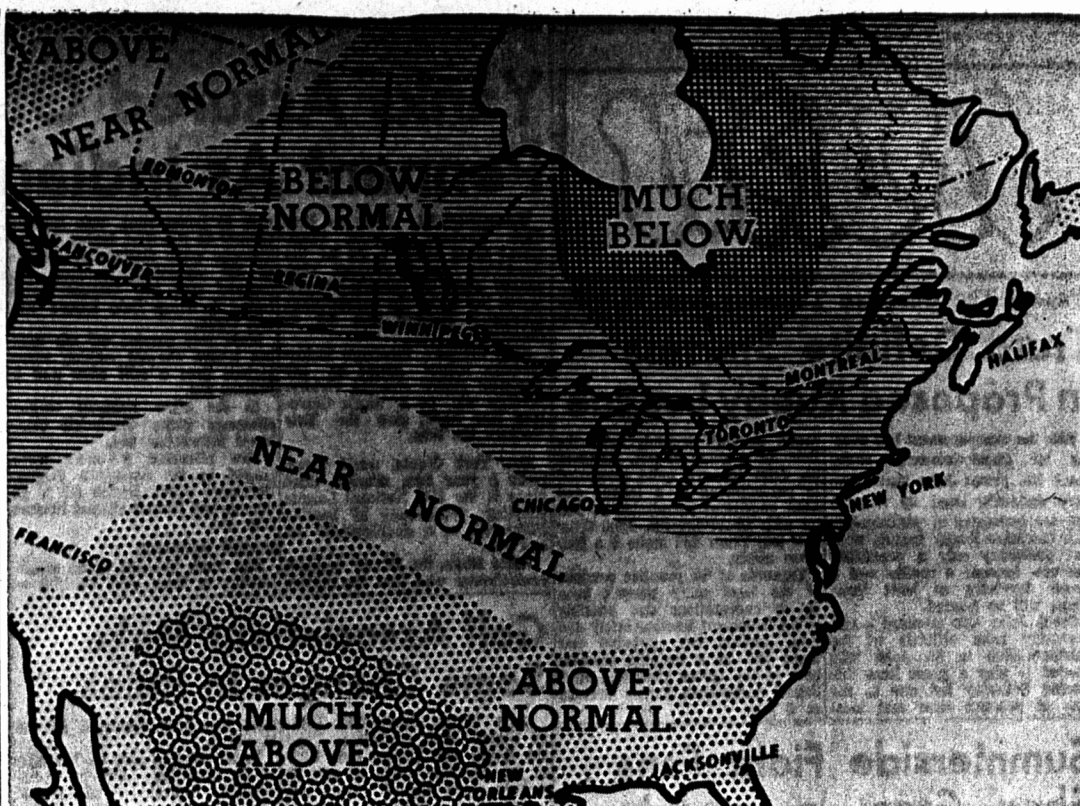

NEW DELHI (CP) - The stamp issued by the Indian post department in 1953 to commemorate the conquest of Mount Everest has won a prize awarded by the national Italian Olympic committee. This is the first Indian stamp to have won an international award.

Tuberculosis Patients In Canada Declined In 1954

OTTAWA (CP)—Numbers of patients in tuberculosis sanatoria and TB units of general hospitals declined last year for the first time in Canadian history. The bureau of statistics said Friday that patients in hospitals decreased to 13,220 at the end of last year from 16,051 at the end of 1953, a drop of 5.2 per cent. The rate for each 100,000 of population fell from 109 in 1953 to 100 in 1954, the lowest level in seven years.

Between 1938 and 1954 annual admissions of persons with TB, or who were suspected of having the disease and were later discharged, increased 66.2 per cent. Deaths from tuberculosis dropped 71.8 per cent during the last 10 years. A corresponding decrease has taken place in the number of deaths in institutions which have dropped 62.4 per cent over the period.

Bed complement of TB institutions increased from 85.2 for each 100,000 of population in 1938 to 116.5 in 1954. Since 1946 the actual number of beds has risen by 4,089 or 30.1 per cent.

"Long John Silver" At Prince Edward

Young Kit Taylor does an excellent job in his first motion picture role, and it is to be hoped that he can maintain the candor and freshness which he brings to the screen in his role as Jim. In addition he's a handsome lad who is without doubt one of the promises for the future. Connie Gilchrist proves delightful, too, in the role of Purity Pinker, hoping to be the one who can tame the rascous Long John Silver and get him to settle down to domestic tranquility.

There is a big cast, and each one deserves credit for making the whole so outstanding, but to cite a few whose acting is noteworthy, there are Lloyd Berrell, as Mendoza the rival of Long John Silver; Grant Taylor, as Patch; Henry Gilbert as Billie Bowlegs; and Rodney Taylor as Tarsal Hands.

Taking advantage of all this talent and the values of production, the director Byron Haskin has realized a production which will appeal to young and old alike. It was Haskin who also directed the highly successful earlier production of "Treasure Island," and his experience has resulted in an even greater production with more emotional impact.

OTTAWA (CP)—Tommy Shields, 60, sports editor of the Ottawa Citizen for the last 19 years and a sports writer with the paper for 30 years, has been transferred at his request to the Citizen's general news desk. The Citizen says that Jack Koffman, 43, for many years an associate of Shields, takes over as acting sports editor.

PLANS NEW LAKE TRY

TORONTO (CP)—Jim Edmunds, physical training instructor at Collins Bay penitentiary at Kingston, said Tuesday he will make his second attempt to swim Lake Ontario in July, 1956. The 225-pound 51-year-old swimmer came within four miles of conquering the lake in August. He said he hopes to make the plunge about July 10, if weather is favorable.

Lawbreaking Increases In Canada's Urban Centres

OTTAWA (CP)—Lawbreaking edged upwards last year in Canada's urban centres. Police recorded 1,832,324 offences of all kinds in communities of more than 4,100 population, the Bureau of statistics reported Tuesday in its annual summary of police statistics. The 1953 total was 1,819,171.

Sixty-six murders were reported last year, two more than the year before. There were 109 manslaughter cases, down three from 1953. Aggravated assault cases increased sharply to 1,638 from 938.

Simple thefts rose to 75,222 from 65,653; burglaries to 22,493 from 21,083; auto thefts to 13,172 from 12,573, and robberies to 2,153 from 1,944.

Impaired driving prosecutions rose to 8,886 from 8,190 while drunk driving prosecutions fell to 2,347 from 2,745. Prosecutions for reckless driving rose to 2,933 from 2,006.

Police in these municipalities investigated 162,788 traffic accidents about the same as in 1953. Deaths and injuries were less—deaths down to 756 from 806 and injuries to 33,289 from 34,803. Also investigated were 324 drownings, five more than in 1953.
