Capt. Robert H. Mahar, of Charlottetown now in command of a Company of Infantry in Korea, writes an interesting letter and tells of himself and other Islanders in his unit listening with delight to Don Messer and his Islanders on a radio program in Korea. "We just want Don Messer to know that we hear and appreciate his music away out here," C. P. Mahar writes. "There are only four or five Islanders left in the Battalion," he writes. Lieut. John J. Murnaghan of Charlottetown, is unit welfare officer, Pte. R. G. Sherren son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Sherren of Crapaud is one of the unit signallers. Pte. Melvin T. Yeo of Richmond and Pte. Wilfred Blaquiere of Summerside are riflemen.

A few other Islanders spread out among other companies also "wish to say thanks for a little bit of home."

All ranks live in bunks built into the hills. They are very comfortable and many of them contain radios bought in Japan while on leave. Anyone with a radio is, of course, very popular, says Capt. Mahar.

Morale in the regiment is excellent. Good mail service and excellent food are two of the important factors contributing to the morale.

"The Canadian soldier is well thought of by his brothers in arms in this theatre," Capt. Mahar states in his interesting letter. He also sent along a copy of "The Crown News," the journal of 1 Commonwealth Division.
