**Glasgow Education Director Says Best Teachers Required**

Dr. Stewart Mackintosh, director of education for Glasgow, Scotland, who is spending two months in Canada, said yesterday "It is imperative that we improve conditions of the teachers as the success of any educational system depends on the quality of the people working in the schools. They are in the front line of education. We must attract the best if we expect to give the best."

"This is the first year the Canadian scheme has been put into operation. An educationist is here from England, India, Australia and Scotland to see what is happening in various aspects of the educational field in Canada and discuss with your educator our common problems."

**COMMON PROBLEM**  
Dr. Mackintosh maintains the problems are common the world over as "kids are the same everywhere." He was greatly impressed with "the vitality of Canadian education in trying to meet the needs of a rapidly expanding and affluent society".

He is convinced education is a country's most important single investment — in the future of youth and its ability to do well economically. It is for this reason he emphasized the vital need of good teaching as he has noted a world-wide resurgence in education at the primary and high school level and further into vocational and professional fields.

The greatest single need in improving education in any country is that of better teachers with more thorough and longer technical training — and paying them better wages. Accomplishment of the aims of serious educators is one of the reasons behind the tour under the fellowship scheme as "there is a great need for practices of ideas in teaching practices between nations of the world and particularly between nations of the Commonwealth."

**MUCH TO LEARN**  
Dr. Mackintosh maintains all countries have much to learn from each other. "It is not a matter of looking to any one nation for guidance, instead it is looking at what all countries are doing and adapting the good things to meet our own distinctive needs. We must all find solutions to our problems, but we can do it if we are willing to learn from each other."

**CAUSES MUCH GRIEF**  
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**First Project For Province Is Approved**

The erection of a modern kitchen as an addition to the present Community Hall, the 1967 centennial project proposed by the Covehead, West Covehead and Stanhope committees was the first for this province to receive federal and provincial approval. It was announced yesterday by the provincial secretary, Dr. L. J. Dewar.

The total costs of the project will be in excess of \$2,000 with the three communities paying close to half the total expenditure.

The Centennial project grants are available to towns, villages, etc.; on a one dollar Federal one dollar provincial and one dollar initiating agency per capita schedule based on the population count as of June 1, 1963.

Dr. Dewar also stated that a number of applications appear to be in the formative stage and it is expected that these will be finalized and forwarded to the end of October which is the last day for receiving project applications. He stressed the necessity for all applications to be submitted no later than the deadline date of Oct. 31.

**Western Editor Flails At Wayne And Shuster**

It was back in 1889 when Rudyard Kipling penned the lines, "Oh, East is East, and West is West, and never the twain shall meet." Canada was just 12 years old then and it was not until 10 years later, in 1905, that the province of Alberta came into being.

In 1889 the bulk of Canada was in the east, British Columbia and Manitoba were then part of Canada, true, but they were quite underdeveloped at that time. The west of Canada and the established east were worlds apart.

Things appear not to have changed a great deal in the interim, in some respects at least. Wayne and Shuster started their Trans-Canada tour in Charlottetown this year. Here they were made "free men" of the city, the first time such an honor had been accorded anyone.

This was done despite the fact the show they presented here this summer was basically the same one the pair played during the summer of 1964.

In Edmonton last week they didn't fare so well.

**BEGAN SEPT. 10**  
It all started on Sept. 10 when the entertainment editor of the Edmonton Journal, a Barry Westgate, wrote from information he had received from United Community Fund officials, that was a pleasant, if brief, thought that comedians Wayne and Shuster might be around to give this year's United Community Fund Appeal a rousing send-off.

"According to sources in Toronto, 'travel problems' will prevent the pair from appearing at the opening breakfast here Monday morning, Sept. 27.

"The bright idea here was to have them appear briefly at the breakfast and then get them off to Calgary in plenty of time. "But an uncommunicative 'no'

came in from Toronto. "Apparently an 'afternoon rehearsal' in Calgary was given as the reason.

"Obviously that Toronto office has a strange concept of Western geography if it think a day's ride exists between Alberta's two major cities.

"Or perhaps that 20 minutes in the cause of charity isn't important enough.

**JUST HELLO**  
"They'd be available for any Sunday night concert," organizers here were told, "But not to perform. Just to say hello."

Plans were changed and Charlottetown's "free men" took the time to appear at the kick-off breakfast.

They had arrived in Edmonton at 11:30 Thursday night. They had risen in Winnipeg at six a.m. the same day, flown to Saskatoon and spent the day there taking part in United Fund engagements.
