## ROBERTS SOUNDS A WARNING NOTE

### What Will Happen the Burghers

#### WHO BREAK THEIR OATH OR HARBOR BOERS

#### DeWet Moving Eastward—He Asks Surrender of British.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

PRETORIA, Aug. 20.—Lord Roberts' proclamation, after reciting the fact that many have broken the oath to maintain neutrality and that the leniency extended to the burghers is not appreciated, warns all who break their oaths in future that they will be punished by death, imprisonment or fine.

He declares that all burghers in districts occupied by the British, except those who take the oath, will be regarded as prisoners of war or transported, and that buildings on farms where the enemy or his scouts are harbored will be liable to be razed.

PRETORIA, Aug. 20.—General DeWet appeared yesterday at North Comandoo Nek, held by General Baden-Powell, and sent in a flag of truce asking the surrender of the British force. Baden-Powell replied asking what terms General DeWet was prepared to offer. General DeWet is evidently moving eastward.

## CANADA'S WINNINGS AT PARIS EXHIBITION

### Conspicuous in Number of Prizes

#### A GOLD MEDAL COMES TO P. E. ISLAND.

#### Awards Made to the Other Provinces as Well.

LONDON, Aug. 20.—Canada is conspicuous in the number of prizes awarded to her at the Paris Exhibition. In class 24 the Government of Canada gets the gold medal; in class 39, the Governments of Manitoba, Ontario and Nova Scotia get the collective exhibit grand prize, and the Province of Quebec, the Department of Agriculture grand prize.

The Governments of Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick and the Northwest Territories get gold medals.

Canada, in the collective exhibit, won the grand prize in class 59.

## FIGHTING IN THE STREETS OF PEKIN

### Part of the City Reported on Fire.

#### CAPTURE OF NEW CHWANG CONFIRMED.

#### The Detention of the Empress Dowager by Prince Tung.

ROME, Aug. 20.—A despatch from Taku, August 18, says fighting continues in the streets of Peking and the allies have bombarded the point that is still resisting Prince Tung prevented the departure of the Empress Dowager.

BUSSELS, Aug. 20.—The Belgian Foreign Consul has the following from Tien Tsin under date, August 18th. M. Ket is Belgian vice consul, confirms the report of the bombardment and capture of New Chwang by the Russians.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—The Navy Department has received the following:

CHEFOO, Aug. 18.—The telegraph line to Peking is interrupted. Information from Japanese sources says the Empress Dowager is detained by Prince Tung in the inner city—which is being bombarded by the allies.

Chaffee reports that he entered the legation grounds on the evening of the 14th. Eight were wounded during the day's fighting. Otherwise all are well.

LONDON, August 20.—Rear Admiral Bruce cables the Admiralty from Chefoo, August 19: I am informed on the authority of Japanese that street fighting still continues in Peking, part of which is on fire.
