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SDU Debaters Down Dalhousie

St. Dunstan's University won its first Maritime intercollegiate debate of the season last night, defeating a team from Dalhousie by a unanimous decision. The debate was held in the SDU gym.

Representing St. Dunstan's were Paul Batchelder, a junior arts student, and Weston MacAleer, a member of the sophomore arts class.

Vibert Rosemary, who graduated from SDU last year and Joseph Williams, debated for Dalhousie.

The topic of the debate was: Resolved that the United States should have given full military support to the Bay of Pigs invasion of Cuba.

Dalhousie upheld the affirmative.

Judges for the debate were Mayor A. Walther Gaudet, Dr. J.C. Simnett and Col. Leo F. MacDonald.

In their remarks, the judges considered St. Dunstan's clearly defined outline and its development of the resolution were the major factors by which it was judged the winner. The three judges felt that the teams were equally strong in rebuttal.

Chairman for last night's debate was John R. MacDonald.

Mental Health Role Of Teachers Outlined

The whole child fully by himself but they must make every necessary contribution. Dr. Beck also outlined some methods which teachers can use to understand their students better and also to understand the home life of their students better.

This program on the role of the teacher in mental health was organized by Urban McQuaid, president of the P.E.I. division of the Canadian Mental Health Association. Assistant Dr. Beck in the presentation of the program were members of the mental health clinic staff.

One of the most important results of the meeting was that it impressed on the teachers some of the various factors which can influence the emotional development of the child and the teachers were given some methods to help overcome the difficulties. Some of the agencies to which teachers can refer pupils who are in need of professional help to solve their problems were also outlined.

In the morning session of Friday's program the highlight was a panel under the chairmanship of Wendell Horton, principal of Queen Charlotte High School. The members of

the panel were Tom Brodie, Grace MacLennan, Rosella Taylor and Hoyton Muggford.

Among the questions discussed were the lack of Home and School in the school program, subject teaching below the high school level, the number of interruptions of class time, and the desirability of having a complete high school program in the Charlottetown schools.

The final part of the morning session was spent in grade meetings. During this time teachers had an opportunity to discuss common problems which they encounter. They also discussed the textbooks used.
