Prisoners Serve Full Jail Terms

The practice, which was apparently employed under the former government, of releasing short term prisoners several days before the expiration of their sentence will be discontinued immediately.

This information was given to Magistrate K.M. Martin, Q.C. by the crown prosecutor Gerald R. Foster in City Police Court yesterday. The question was brought up Monday morning by the magistrate when it was revealed that one of the prisoners had been released by the jailer four days short of completing a

10-day prison term. The situation again arose yesterday when another prisoner revealed to the magistrate that he had been let out, with about four days to go. Asked by the magistrate how and by what authority he was released the prisoner replied, "I don't know, I was just let out." Mr. Foster informed the magistrate that he had taken the matter up with Attorney General R. Bell, following query from the bench Monday morning. These instructions had also been given to the jailer by Mr. Bell, he said.

Driver Fined \$200 In Court

Joseph Cleo Rioux of Summerside drew a fine of \$200 and costs or 30 days in jail when he appeared for sentencing on a charge of driving while impaired yesterday in City Police Court.

Information revealed that the accused had been involved in a collision with another vehicle which had resulted in a woman occupant of the second vehicle being taken to hospital suffering from a broken collar bone.

A plea of not guilty to the charge of drunken driving was entered by Malcolm Stewart of Vernon River. Unrepresented by counsel the accused offered a plea of guilty to the lesser charge of driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol. Not immediately accepted the magistrate remanded accused until Thursday, Oct. 1, without bail.

The crown in all cases was represented by Gerald R. Foster. Defence counsel for Rioux was John Holmes. Magistrate K.M. Martin presided.

Continued from page 1 can countries an opportunity to vote against Cuba if they wished without publically going against one of their own.

The final vote was close: Cuba 38; Canada 31.

Canada apparently won the support of all NATO countries, the bulk of the Commonwealth and many Asian nations. However, lined up against apparently were most of the Latin American countries, the solid Communist bloc and all the delegates from Africa and the Middle East.

Some observers are suggesting that the development was not only a blow to Canada's prestige at the UN but also a jolt to Canada's claims to the rule of an upright, free from colonial taint, between the West and the new nations of Africa and Asia.

Officials of the external affairs department here, when asked for comment, however, replied that they did not regard this setback as affecting Canada's international prestige.

One official commented that the choice of Mr. Macquarrie as nominee was in tribute to his work on the committee the previous year and was not intended as an official candidacy.

Mr. Macquarrie has now served on the Canadian UN delegation for three successive terms, a rare privilege for a member of parliament.

TRAIN'S SIGNAL IS SET BY CAR

SALINA, Kan. (AP) — The fast passenger train came to a grinding halt southeast of Salina Tuesday, stopped by a red signal, indicating another train in the same signal block ahead. But there was none scheduled.

Puzzled, the train crew telephoned the sheriff's office. Undersheriff Bob Rous found Henry W. Wenhe, 41, sound asleep behind the steering wheel of his car which was resting on the Union Pacific track. Wenhe had driven down the track for two miles, Rous said. A tire came off and the car stopped. The exposed metal rim made contact with the rails, flashing the red signal which stopped the train.

Wenhe was charged with drunk driving and jailed.

Gulf Ports See Strike Threat

NEW YORK (AP) — Longshoremen and shipping firms were deadlocked in contract negotiations late Tuesday with a strike threatened for midnight today in Atlantic and gulf ports. "We don't see any light that would lead to an immediate settlement," said federal mediator Thomas G. Dougherty.

Bible Society Plans Drive

The Charlottetown Branch of the Prince Edward Island Auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society has set the week of October 19 for their annual campaign for funds. This announcement was made yesterday by R.J. Rupert, president of the local branch.

In speaking of the need Mr. Rupert stated that despite the fact that portions of the Bible have been translated and distributed in almost 1,200 languages and dialects, there are still many millions of people who have never heard the Christian gospel.

"There is a great and growing hunger for the word of God," said Mr. Rupert, "and at the moment there is substantial waiting list for the Scriptures because sufficient funds have not been made available to supply the need."
