

# Improper Accounts Can Cause Crime

The case of Donald Joseph Gallant, Summerside, charged with breaking and entering Gorie's drug store, April 10, is being used as an example of how improper accounts can cause crime. It is pointed out that a good many don't take advantage of their opportunity and return to law breaking after being freed.

## VICTORIA CAUSEWAY UNDER CONSTRUCTION

Construction of a causeway at Victoria resumed Tuesday morning which will link this south shore village with a provincial park that will be established on the Hampton shore. A safe, sandy, warm, salt water beach extends along the park area, and continues beyond it for a distance of about two miles. The construction of this causeway is expected to provide a large pond, fed by two rivers, and with facilities in the causeway to enable salt water to flow into the pond, and it is anticipated that it will result in one of the largest and finest trout fishing spots in the province. ## S'ide Sewage Plan Snags Price For Harbor Land

The Summerside Town Council last evening verbally sailed around Holman's Island without landing, as the tide of discussion flowed back and forth among the council members on the town's interest in purchasing the island from J. Arthur Clark, of Summerside, for use as a site for a lagoon for sewage disposal. At the present time sewage contaminants, Summerside harbor.

During the early part of the meeting a letter was read from Mr. Clark offering the island to the town for the price of \$40,000 and setting noon, May 20, as the date for decision by the town, on his offer.

Mr. Clark also requested reservation of shooting, hunting and fishing privileges on the island, just prior to adjournment of the council meeting. George Key touched off the discussion when he asked that the town's correspondence from Bedeque ratemakers in regard to the regional school trustees' land incorporation act which was a change during the last session from the form of a mutually agreed Holman's Island within its incorporated boundaries.

**Angeline Seeking Collaboration**  
The 12 school districts which comprise the Summerside Regional High School—the first such regional high school district in the province—will meet "another first" on May 22. The 12 districts have voted unanimously to form a council, under which one school board of trustees would administer the regional high school but also all the elementary schools as well. The legislation enabling the formation of the regional school trustees last night gave approval to representations to be made to the provincial government for the form of a mutually agreed administration, and to increase the number of classrooms in the school.

The school has 160 pupils at the present time but the number of pupils in elementary schools has increased by more than 200 in the last three years. The school's present classroom space will have to be doubled in the regional high school. The school board is currently negotiating with cabinet minister Eucled Arsenault, Wellington, chairman of the board, and with cabinet minister Ulfic Poirier, Mt. Carmel.
